I was unexpectedly thrown into the dispute of the Non-Tabler issue when I was elected International Vice President in Brasov, Romania. Firstly I was very surprised to find out that member countries did not obey the rules of a democratic association. The fact is that these rules were voted on and hence afterwards passed and accepted. Secondly it was a big surprise to find out that the dispute which I thought was solved back in 1992 still was alive and causing extensive trouble. To me it was difficult to experience an AGM where people reacted the way they actually did.

I also believe that the result we ended up with in Brasov was caused by heavy emotional feelings. Had we been able to stay in control and use our common sense we might have had another result. This is thank God all history now.

But it also shows that things should not be left unattended and swept under the carpet. The International Board has to deal with the problems and solve them. The reason why is simple it concerns each and every one of us.

But reflecting on what has happened has given me lots of thoughts. I am proud to have been a member of Round Table and proud to be able to pass on the ideas to new members of the Round Table. We should guard our inheritance, protect it and develop it for the future generations, also keeping in mind that Round Table is our feeding line.

If we have to boil every thing down and find out what we really want the incidences in Brasov clarified to us that it has a lot to do with what we have today. An International Organization which produces friendships across the borders. An organization which also creates service projects in some countries. And hopefully also produces an understanding and respect for other persons and their way of believing.

When we had the almost split in Brasov we found out that the member countries, including the individual members, did not want a split but to find a solution in order for us to stay united.

We have a long history. And the conclusion must be that the ideas of the founders were excellent and they have, as time has shown, been proven their worth.

But do we keep on doing what we have done the past almost 30 years out of comfort and ease, or do we not want to change anything?

Maybe what was right 30 years ago is not right today.
Who has the right answer?

Society and the family patterns have changed along the way. We know as a fact that certain countries have problems getting new members. So the question is do we go for quality or quantity? Or is it in any way possible to find a compromise?

Again who has the right answer?

One can argue that you can only be a good 41'ner if you were broad up in Round Table and hence formed and characterized by the ideas which were predominating back then.

One can also argue that even though you were never a member of Round Table, if you are admitted to a perfectly functioning

club, the 41'ers there will be able to mark and develop you into a good 41'ner in spite of the lacking "background".

To be honest:

Is it not the truth that we can find either a person who has been a Round Tabler but today seldom attends the club meetings or lack to do a proper job or maybe is not even a good friend, or is it not possible that a person who was never so lucky to be invited and join Round Table can develop into a good 41'ner and be a real friend and furthermore be a good supportive and active member of his club?

History has shown often enough that whenever changes occur people get scared. It can be changes in family relations, in ones job or in society. It doesn't really matter. The change in itself scares us for the unknown which we will meet.

So again who is right?

The "old" or "new" generation in our association?

Neither of them should allow themselves to judge their fellow tablers.

Having all this in my thoughts I found it better to ask the members themselves.

It would be easy for the International Board to come to a conclusion and let the members know the direction in which we think we should move in.

To my humble opinion that would not be the right way.

Therefore I took the decision of having a work shop in Interlaken.

It was open to everyone in such a way that the participants were divided into the different groups by randomly drawing lots. Each workshop was headed by a supervisor who presented the issue. Then there was time to have group discussions, and finally each group was asked to present to all the others in writing their conclusion.

This is the way of doing things in a democratic way. We may or may not like the conclusions that are to be included in the minutes from the HYM Meeting in Interlaken, but we can not deny the outcome and the guidelines which we find in the conclusions.

So my request to all you members for the future is to always have in mind that we are here primarily as friends. Remember that we are all equal and no one is better than the rest.

I also sincerely hope that it is by now understood by all that we have to stick to the rules. No member country should disobey what is democratically voted for and accepted.

If changes are wished for then present a proposal for voting at an AGM. And accept the outcome of the vote. Only this way can we avoid severe disputes in the future.

41 International is for each and everyone to enjoy. If you unselfishly help your friends they will return to you even more friendship, help and support.

I as President of 41 International am no more than an individual member. I was elected to do a job during the period of my election. This I modestly hope that you as a member feel. If this is the case then I am happy and satisfied.

Finally: This is my wish: Let us all stay friends and protect our unique association in the future.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE – Version française

J'ai décidé d'écrire cet article et de le présenter en quatre langues pour communiquer les idées et les pensées que j'ai essayé à exprimer aussi dans mes discours lors de différentes AG.

Quand j'ai été élu Vice-Président International à Brasov, en Roumanie, je suis tombé par hasard dans la dispute sur les non-tableurs. Tout d'abord j'étais très étonné du fait que certains pays membres ne respectaient pas les règles d'une association démocratique. En effet, on a voté ces règles et on a par conséquence accepté leur validité. Ensuite j'étais très étonné que ce conflit soit encore actuel et qu'il cause encore des grands problèmes; moi, je pensais que ce sujet avait été réglé déjà en 1992. Pour moi il était difficile de participer à une AG où l'on se comportait de cette manière.

Je crois qu'à Brasov nous sommes arrivés à ce résultat parce que nous avons admis de fortes émotions. Si l'on avait gardé le contrôle et utilisé le bon sens, on n'aurait pas terminé comme ça.

Heureusement, tout cela appartient au passé.

L'incident montre quand-même aussi, qu'on ne devrait pas laisser traîner les affaires. Le Comité International doit s'occuper des problèmes et essayer de trouver des solutions, pour la simple raison qu'il concerne tout le monde.

Ce qui s'est passé m'a fait réfléchir et m'a donné beaucoup de soucis. Je suis fier d'avoir été membre de la Table Ronde et sur le fait de pouvoir communiquer les idées de la Table Ronde aux nouveaux membres. Il faudrait que nous veillions sur notre héritage, que nous le protégions et le développions pour les générations à venir – dans la conscience que la Table Ronde est notre source de candidats futurs.

En résumant tout cela pour découvrir ce qu'on veut vraiment, les incidents à Brasov clarifient qu'il a beaucoup à voir avec la situation actuelle. Une organisation internationale qui crée des amitiés sans frontières. Une organisation qui crée dans certains pays des projets de service / projets sociaux. Et nous espérons qu'elle crée aussi de la compréhension et du respect pour autrui et pour la foi d'autrui. Lors la presque-désunion à Brasov, nous avons découvert que ni les pays membres, ni les membres individuels voulaient une désunion, mais que tout le monde voulait trouver une solution pour rester réunis à l'avenir.

Nous avons une longue histoire. Il faut conclure que les idées des fondateurs furent excellentes et l'expérience nous a montré leur valeur.

Mais faisons-nous la même chose qu'on a fait pendant les derniers 30 ans pour lâcheté ou pour confort, ou bien, voulons-nous changer quelque chose du tout?

Peut-être ce qui était valable et juste il y 30 ans, aujourd'hui n'est plus comme ça. Qui a la bonne réponse?

La société, ainsi que l'environnement familial ont changé au cours des années. Nous savons en fait que quelques pays ont de la peine à trouver des nouveaux membres. La question est donc, s'il faut se concentrer sur la qualité ou sur la quantité. Ou est-il possible dans quelque manière de trouver un compromis? De nouveau, qui connaît la bonne réponse ici?

On pourrait soutenir que personne ne peut être un bon membre du Club 41 que s'il n'a pas "grandi" dans la Table Ronde, parce qu'ainsi il a été formé et caractérisé par les idées préalables de la même. D'autre part, on pourrait soutenir que malgré la base manquante vous pourriez devenir un bon membre du Club 41, même

sans avoir été un membre de la Table Ronde, si les membres actuels sont capables de vous former et de vous développer.

Soyons sincères:

N'est-il pas vrai que certains membres de la Table Ronde ne participent que rarement aux réunions du Club ou n'accomplissent pas leur tâche ou ne sont même pas de bons amis? N'est-il pas possible non plus que quelqu'un qui n'avait jamais eu la chance d'être invité dans un club ou de participer à une Table Ronde pourrait devenir un bon membre du Club 41 et pourrait devenir un vrai ami et en outre un membre actif et soutenant du Club?

L'histoire nous a montré que l'homme a peur de changements. Il peut s'agir de changements dans l'environnement familial, dans le domaine professionnel ou social. C'est plus ou moins égal. Des changements en soi nous font peur, parce que nous ne savons pas ce que nous attend le lendemain.

Alors, qui a donc raison?

La "vieille" ou la "nouvelle" génération dans notre association?

Après toutes ces pensées, je trouvais le mieux de demander les membres eux-mêmes.

Il serait trop facile pour le Comité International de trouver une solution et d'informer les membres dans quelle direction il faut continuer.

A mon humble avis ce ne serait pas la bonne route.

C'est la raison pour laquelle j'ai décidé d'organiser des workshops à Interlaken.

Ces séminaires étaient ouverts pour tous les membres, en répartissant les participants dans les différents groupes par un tirage au sort. Chaque workshop avait un superviseur, qui présentait le thème. Après on avait du temps pour des discussions en groupe, et enfin, chaque groupe devait présenter par écrit ses conclusions aux autres.

Voilà comment les affaires sont réglées de manière démocratique. Si nous aimons les décrets d'Interlaken ou pas, nous ne pouvons pas rejeter les résultats et les règles qui ont été décidés là-bas.

Seulement ainsi est-il possible d'éviter des conflits sérieux à l'avenir.

Le Club 41 International devrait faire plaisir à tous les membres. Si vous aidez vos amis sans égoïsme, l'aide, l'amitié et le support retourneront chez vous de manière multiple.

Moi, intitulé Président du Club 41 International ne suis rien qu'un membre individuel. J'ai été élu pour remplir une tâche pendant mon année de mandat. J'espère que vous, comme membres vous le sentiez également. Si c'est le cas, je suis heureux et content.

Enfin, j'ai un désir:

Laissez-nous rester tous des amis et conserver notre association unique dans l'avenir.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE – deutsche Version

Ich habe mich entschlossen, diesen Artikel zu schreiben und ihn in vier Sprachen vorzulegen, um jene Ideen und Gedanken zu vermitteln, welche ich auch in meinen Reden anlässlich der verschiedenen National AGMs auszudrücken versucht habe.

In den Wortstreit über das Thema Nicht-Tablers bin ich zufällig hineingeraten, als ich in Brasov, Rumänien zum Internationalen Vize-präsidenten ernannt wurde. Erstens war ich sehr überrascht über die Tatsache, dass Mitgliedsländer sich nicht an die Regeln eines demokratischen Verbandes hielten. Tatsache ist, dass über ebendiese Regeln abgestimmt worden war, und dass man sie in der Folge für gültig erklärt und angenommen hatte. Zweitens war ich sehr überrascht, dass dieser Streitpunkt immer noch aktuell war und auch noch grosse Konflikte auslöste; dabei dachte ich, das Thema wäre bereits 1992 abgeschlossen worden. Es war schwer erträglich für mich, an einem AGM teilzunehmen, wo die Leute sich so verhielten.

Ich glaube, dass wir in Brasov so weit gekommen sind, weil sehr starke Gefühle mit im Spiel waren. Hätten wir die Kontrolle behalten und unseren gesunden Menschenverstand eingesetzt, hätte es nicht so geendet.

Zum Glück ist das heute alles Geschichte.

Es zeigt aber auch, dass man die Dinge nicht einfach laufen lassen und unter den Teppich kehren sollte. Der Internationale Vorstand muss die Probleme in Angriff nehmen und sie lösen – aus dem einfachen Grunde, dass sie uns alle betreffen.

Was passiert war, hat mich immer wieder sehr beschäftigt. Ich bin stolz darauf, ein Mitglied des Round Table gewesen zu sein und auch darauf, den neuen Mitgliedern die Ideen des Round Table zu vermitteln. Wir sollten über unser Erbe wachen, es schützen und es weiterentwickeln, um es an die kommenden Generationen weiter zu geben - in dem Bewusstsein, dass der Round Table unsere Nachwuchsquelle ist.

Wenn wir das alles zu einem Punkt bringen und herausfinden, was wir wirklich wollen, dann klären die Zwischenfälle in Brasov auf, dass es viel damit zu tun hat, was wir heute vorfinden. Eine Internationale Organisation, welche Freundschaften über Grenzen hinaus schafft. Eine Organisation, welche in manchen Ländern auch Serviceprojekte / soziale Projekte startet und welche hoffentlich auch Verständnis und Respekt für andere und deren Glauben schafft. Nach dem "Beinahe-Zerwürfnis" in Brasov fanden wir heraus, dass die Mitgliedsländer, sowie die Einzelmitglieder kein Zerwürfnis, sondern eine Lösung finden wollten, um weiterhin vereint zu bleiben.

Wir dürfen auf eine lange Geschichte zurückblicken. Und das Fazit muss sein, dass die Ideen der Gründer ausgezeichnet waren und erfahrungsgemäss durchaus ihre Berechtigung haben.

Aber tun wir denn aus Bequemlichkeit und Komfort dasselbe, was wir die letzten 30 Jahre gemacht haben, oder wollen wir überhaupt etwas ändern?

Vielleicht ist das, was vor 30 Jahren Gültigkeit hatte, heute nicht mehr so. Wer hat die richtige Antwort?

Die Gesellschaft und die Familienstrukturen haben sich im Laufe der Zeit verändert. Es ist eine uns bekannte Tatsache, dass einige Länder Mühe haben, neue Mitglieder zu finden. Die Frage ist also, ob wir uns auf die Qualität oder auf die Quantität konzentrieren sollen. Oder ist es irgendwie möglich, einen Kompromiss zu finden? Wer kennt hier wiederum die richtige Antwort?

Man könnte behaupten, dass man nur ein guter 41-er sein kann, wenn man im Round Table "aufgewachsen" ist und somit von den Ideen, welche damals geherrscht haben, geformt und charakterisiert wurde. Man könnte aber auch behaupten, dass man trotz des fehlenden Backgrounds ein guter 41-er werden könnte, auch ohne jemals ein Mitglied eines Round Table gewesen zu sein, wenn die

anwesenden 41-er fähig sind, ein neu aufgenommenes Mitglied in einen gut funktionierenden Club zu formen und zu entwickeln.

Um ehrlich zu sein:

Ist es nicht wahr, dass gewisse Leute, die Round Tabler waren, heute nur noch selten die Club-Meetings besuchen oder ihre Aufgabe nicht richtig erfüllen oder nicht einmal gute Freunde sind; oder ist es nicht auch möglich, dass jemand, der nie das Glück hatte, in einen Club eingeladen zu werden oder an einem Round Table teilzunehmen, zu einem guten 41-er werden kann und ein wirklicher Freund und überdies ein unterstützendes und aktives Mitglied des Clubs werden kann?

Die Geschichte hat gezeigt, dass der Mensch Angst vor Veränderung hat. Das können Veränderungen im familiären, beruflichen oder gesellschaftlichen Bereich sein. Es kommt nicht wirklich darauf an. Veränderungen an und für sich beängstigen uns, weil wir nicht wissen, was auf uns zukommt.

Also, wer hat diesmal Recht?

Die "alte" oder die "neue" Generation in unserer Organisation?

Keine von beiden sollte sich erlauben, ihre Mitgliederkollegen zu verurteilen.

Nach all diesen Überlegungen fand ich es für das Beste, die Mitglieder selbst zu fragen.

Es wäre für den Internationalen Vorstand einfach, eine Lösung auszuarbeiten und die Mitglieder zu informieren, in welche Richtung es weiter gehen soll.

Meiner bescheidenen Meinung nach wäre dies nicht der richtige Weg.

Deshalb habe ich entschieden, verschiedene Workshops in Interlaken zu organisieren.

Diese standen allen Mitgliedern offen, indem die Teilnehmer nach einer Zufalls-Auslosung in die verschiedenen Gruppen eingeteilt wurden.

Jeder Workshop hatte einen Supervisor, der das Thema vorstellte. Dann folgten Gruppendiskussionen, und zum Schluss musste jede Gruppe ihre Beschlüsse den anderen schriftlich präsentieren.

So regelt man die Dinge auf demokratische Art und Weise. Ob uns die Beschlüsse von Interlaken passen oder nicht, wir können die Resultate und die Richtlinien, die dabei herausgekommen sind, nicht ablehnen.

Also meine Bitte für die Zukunft an alle Mitglieder: Haltet Euch stets vor Augen, dass wir primär Freunde sind. Erinnert Euch daran, dass wir alle gleich sind und dass niemand besser ist als die Anderen. Ich hoffe auch aufrichtig, dass alle verstanden haben worum es geht, nämlich sich an die Regeln zu halten. Kein Mitgliedsland sollte demokratisch abgestimmte und angenommene Regeln missachten. Wenn Änderungen gewünscht sind, legt einen Vorschlag zur Abstimmung an einem AGM vor – und akzeptiert das Resultat der Wahl. Nur so können wir ernsthafte Auseinandersetzungen in Zukunft vermeiden.

Der Club 41 International sollte allen Freude bereiten. Wenn man seinen Freunden selbstlos hilft, wird noch mehr Hilfe, Freundschaft und Unterstützung zurückkommen.

Ich als Präsident des Club 41 International bin auch nur ein einzelnes Mitglied. Ich wurde gewählt, um während meines Amtsjahres eine Aufgabe zu erfüllen. Ich hoffe, dass Ihr als Mitglieder es genauso empfindet. Wenn es so ist, bin ich glücklich und zufrieden.

Zum Schluss noch ein Wunsch:

Lasst uns alle Freunde bleiben und unseren einzigartigen Verband in Zukunft schützen.

MINUTES OF THE AGM

HELD IN COPENHAGEN ON APRIL 5th, 2003

- President Sam Sampath welcomed the delegates and all 41ers, presented and opened the meeting.

He informed that out of 20 Associations 16 were present or represented and then asked the Presidents of Club 41 Denmark, Niels Holmen Andresen, to address the meeting.
(Absent: Cyprus – Indian Ocean – New Zealand – Sweden)



Arrival: Beat Berger, Dieter Straka, Michael Pedersen, Carina Dragovits

- The President of Denmark, Niels, welcomed the delegates and all other 41ers to Copenhagen. He wished to all a very pleasant stay in his country. He hoped that we would have a successful meeting and he benefited from the AGM in the capital of Denmark to charter a new Club N° 87, called "Grev Manner". The incoming 41ers were presented and applauded by their new international friends.

- President Sam Sampath thanked Niels for his kind words, congratulated the incoming members and then asked all present to be upstanding for a minute of silence in remembrance of all 41ers, all over the world, and especially for Dany Werner, former International President, who passed away since the HYM held in Bangalore in September 2002.

- Indian Ocean and New Zealand have informed the Secretary that due to the long distance they could not participate at the AGM, but have sent their regards and they wish us a fruitful meeting. Because of business reasons, Peter Poech had to stay in Vienna and apologised for his absence.

- The President Sampath welcomed then Tero Lindell, Daniel Ponchon and Guy Mercier, Past-Presidents of Club 41 International, and thanked them for their participation at Copenhagen.

The delegate of Zambia, Andy Anderson, was officially welcomed to his first AGM.

- The International Secretary had no announcement to read; no correspondence has arrived to him.

- Secretary Marc Niederlender sent out the minutes of the HYM held in Bangalore (India) in September 2002. The Presidents and the Iro's of all the Associations received these minutes except for the President of New Zealand. His letter came back to the Secretary 6 months later, mentioned "Unknown".

- Matters arising from the minutes. The President Sam Sampath drew the attention to the fact that any corrections should be made in the delivered copies. He gave details of it.

There were no other matters arising and so the President Sam and the Secretary Marc signed the minutes.

- No remarks on the report of the boards members were raised.

- Financial report by the Treasurer Marc Niederlender. Because of no payments or of partly payments only from some Associations, the outgoing Past-President, Beat Berger, could not be repaid a whole amount. He spent 9100 Euros out of his own pocket. Up till the AGM of Copenhagen, the position of Club 41 International, concerning the last 2 financial years, was :
- For Cyprus, 136 Euros stayed to pay.

- For Switzerland, the Treasurer, Franz Notter, affirmed that the payment has been done.
- Same case for Germany, after a lot of letters' exchanges, the Treasurer Wolfgang Förster, confirmed that his Association has paid.
- Denmark owned 10,22 Euros.
- India owned 23 Euros.
- GB and Ireland, 46 Euros.
- Israel was late for 2001-2002 and owned the full fees for 2002-2003, given an amount of 451 Euros (Payment has been done after the meeting)
- Indian Ocean had to pay 49 Euros.
- For the Netherlands, a difference of 148 Euros was due.
- New Zealand had got behind a payment of 722 Euros, but we had a problem with the number of there Clubs.
- Romania had to pay the current year. (Half payment has been done after the meeting).
- Sweden: no payment for 2001-2002, no payment for 2002-2003.
- South Africa, remained to pay 986 Euros.
- Finland hadn't paid the last invoiced fees.
- Zambia owned 19 Euros (payment has been done after the meeting).

All other Associations had normally paid there fees.

The International Treasurer asked for a promptly putting in order for a good running of Club 41 International.

11. Nominations.

From the voting came out :

- Alain de la Bretesche (France) was accepted as Vice-President of Club 41 International.
- John Hudson (South Africa) was confirmed as future Vice-President for 2004-2005.
- For Germany, the future candidate for the Vice-Presidency 2005-2006 will be known after there AGM in Mainz at the end of May.

12. The future venues :

HYM Interlaken (Switzerland) 2003 and AGM Arras (France) 2004 were running well.

The HYM 2004 will be held in Belgium in the last week of September and the pre-tour will begin the 26th of September.

Durban and South Africa will wait for us in 2005 for the AGM of Club 41 International.

13. The President Sam presented the new elected Vice-President for the year 2003-2004: Alain de la Bretesche.

14. The following positions were confirmed:

- Editor: Dieter Straka (Austria), Gerhard Wirth (Austria) and Peter Poehl (Austria).
- Archivist: Otto Adelhofer (Austria).
- YAP Convenor: Jacques Menival (France), assisted by Ulver Oswald (Germany)
- WEB Master: Renato Bonfini (Italy)

Welcome to these new co-opted staff members.

Samy Sampath, generously, offered to Jacques, Ulver and Renato, to contribute to there small expenses in doing their job, 150 Euros each.

Because of absence of any budget, this contribution will be paid out of the own budget of the President Sampath.

15. Rules modifications.

The President of Club 41 International began by reading the letter called "Proposal for..." and dated 11th of June, 2002. This letter was attached to the agenda.

He continued by reading the letter of Old Tablers Suomi Finland concerning this matter.

One by one, each Associations confirmed their vote expressed in Bangalore.

Including the fact that two Associations were present in India and were absent in Copenhagen, the majority of 2/3 was reached. By 20 votes to 2, the rules will be changed as mentioned in the letter dated 11th of June, 2002.

The Editor added that only Switzerland and Austria were providing a copy per member and that there were Associations on the other hand that didn't even provide one copy per Club.

17. Maurice Brun, President of Switzerland, presented now the next HYM in Interlaken.

18. Daniel Ponchon, former International President from France, invited to participate at the AGM in Arras in June 2004.

His Club friends gave us the wish to come in their French town with a amusing and funny dancing show.

President Bengt Norvik, President of Sweden. Their wish was a payment by members and not by Clubs. Alas, it's impossible.

Unfortunately, Sweden left our organisation; Sweden is out of Club 41 International because of no payment.

- Sam asked for all the changes to be included in the new Directory before printing.
- The President Sam Sampath regretted that some Associations selected the same dates for holding their AGM.
- Marc Niederlender, Secretary, said: you know, the world is going crazy, when the best rapper is a white guy, when the best golfer is a black guy, when the Swiss hold the America's cup, when the German's don't want to go to war, and when France is accusing the U.S. of arrogance; happily, in Club 41 International, we have had the best International President. REPORT OF THE HYM

Held in INTERLAKEN On October 25th, 2003

- 1) The President of Switzerland, Maurice Brun, welcomed the President of Club 41 International, Michael Dalbo Pedersen, and his board, the delegates and all 41'ers. He wished all a successful meeting.

- 2) President Michael opened the meeting and thanked President Maurice for his kind words. He welcomed the former International and National Presidents, the delegates and Tablers present. During his travels this year, after he was elected President of

Club 41 International in Copenhagen in April, he has tried to attend as many Meetings as possible. Switzerland was in fact country n° 10 in the past half year and he was happy to say that during those past six months he had so many contacts from all over the world. Michael thanked for the feedback and the greetings and for the friendship, hospitality and support. He reminded how important it is to live by rules printed in our directory. One must remember that the rules and statutes are the same for each member country.

Changes can be made, but it is important to emphasize that changes can only take place after proper procedure. That proposals have to be put forward, voted for and the result must then be respected and followed.

The President noted that after the ratification of the rule 3a in Denmark it has been much more joyful to visit the member countries. The spirit had changed and the people are looking forward to attend the Meetings again.

So he could say that nowadays we could again experience the true friendship and hospitality which are also the goals of our association.

He wished a rewarding 41 International HYM Meeting and asked for an acceptance of the new agenda. This agenda was agreed unanimously.

- 4) Then the President asked all present to join him in one minute of silence, and to be standing up in remembrance of all our friends who passed away since the AGM held in Copenhagen.

5) Apologies for Absence.

Dirk Wesseling, IRO from 40+ Holland, informed the Secretary Marc Niederlender that in connection with his business it was not possible for him to attend the HYM.

Indian Ocean is really too far from Switzerland and the National Secretary apologised his association for not being in Interlaken.

Oddbjorn Eriksen, IRO from 41 Norway presented his apologies for not attending the HYM. Unfortunately the budget situation of the National Board did not allow the expenses to travel to Switzerland.

Excuses also from New Zealand by National President Malcolm Moore.

6) Correspondence and announcements.

- Marc Niederlender, Secretary of Club 41 International, received a letter from Romania, who had before the AGM in Brasov one vote and paid half fees. Since this AGM, the Romanian Association due full fees and has 2 votes. It wishes to go back and asks for one vote only.

- From India, Marc was informed that the Indian Association had 59 Clubs and not 69 as indicated earlier. But the Secretary said that the fees were invoiced like the amount printed in our Directory and we have in our booklet 71 Clubs for India.

- Great-Britain and Ireland wished explanations concerning their invoiced bank charges.

- Norway: 22 pieces of Courier Magazine were shipped and not 25 pieces like ordered and invoiced. The Editor Dieter Straka said that 3 magazines will be offered.

- 7) Secretary Marc sent out the minutes of the AGM held in Copenhagen (Denmark) in the last week of August.

- 8) There were no matters arising and the minutes could be signed by the Past-President Sam Sampath, the President Michael Dalbo Pedersen and the Secretary Marc Niederlender without remarks.

- 9) No comments on the reports of the board members were raised.

- 10) Presentation of the workshops

- 11) Conclusion of the workshops

President Michael Dalbo Pedersen emphasized that the results of the workshops are only guidelines and no final approval.

After the HYM Meeting in Interlaken it is up to each member country to put forward proposals based on this for voting in Arras. No proposals mean that no action will be taken on

these subjects. So please discuss them at home and come back with suggestions and proposals so we can vote and move forward in order to further incorporate this and hence develop 41 International.

These topics should not be organised by the National organisation but by the local Club.

The way it has to work is to contact the National IRO and he will inform about the possibilities of contact to local Clubs.

Club 41 is not a travel agency, but the main thing should be to give assistance if something unforeseen happens to a 41er in a foreign country.

The International Directory should be the assistance if needed and it is suggested that the National Association sends a copy to each local Club.

Home hosting becomes more and more difficult since the time of Round Table.

The International Directory should be extended with a few pages to announce National events so more 41'ers are informed about possibilities to attend meetings like ski-meetings, golf-meeting etc.

Conclusion: the International Directory should be the main tool in promoting the above mentioned topics.

No more remarks as mentioned in the Workshop conclusion arose.

12) Remarks of the Young Ambassadors Programme.

President Michael Dalbo Pedersen thanked everyone involved in this Programme and told them their work was very much appreciated. He also thanked the hosting families and the participants for their efforts and said their feedback and response was much valued.

He also welcomed South Africa and New Zealand as new hosting countries.

No more remarks arose except for those mentioned in the Workshops.

13) The International Treasurer Marc Niederlender presented the accounts of the year of President Sam Sampath :

- From Austria: nothing to be afraid for. Austria pays always faster than their shadows. They were behind of

0,04 Euro in Copenhagen; they had an overpayment of 0,96 Euro in Interlaken.

- Belgium and Switzerland paid their fees in time, but not their Courier bills. Belgium owes 225 Euro and Switzerland 1012,50 Euro. The Treasurer reminds that the Courier bills were given out in Copenhagen 6 month ago.
- Cyprus is late with 132,54 Euro. This amount concerns the year before.
- Germany owed 2311,87 Euro for the year of Beat Berger. The German Treasurer said, it was paid. That was right, it was paid, but by a cheque sent out by Lions Club. In this case, Marc could not accept it. He didn't know from which country it was coming, all the most as the amount paid was different as the amount due. Finally, the German friends owe 517,50 Euro.
- Denmark has not paid the Courier costs: 257,82 Euro.
- Same shame for France, it remains 675 Euro for the International Courier.
- The English Treasurer dispute some bank charges and the difference between what the International Treasurer is waiting for and what Great-Britain and Ireland have paid is: 496,02 Euro.
- Italy is used paying no matter what. Generally, they pay always more than they owe. But in Interlaken, extraordinarily, Italy had to pay 203,78 Euro.
- Israel pays often by cash on the occasion of a meeting, not always the right amount, because of exchange rates. So, there remain 91,41 Euros to pay.
- For India, there remain only transfer expenses: 46,06 Euro is the amount due.
- Indian Ocean had an overpayment. They were in advance for 49,50 Euro.
- Norway forgot the Courier bill of 56,25 Euro.
- The Netherlands paid twice in 2001-2002 and nothing in 2002-2003. They owed till the HYM 283,56 Euro.
- For New-Zealand, they had 26 Clubs in our booklet, Marc Niederlender had many difficulties to find an agreement. N-Z had announced 16 Clubs instead of 26 first. Later, another board member said : we are 14 Clubs. After many invoice changes, payment was always missing, but our far away friends mean to have paid in time. It was not untrue, but the Treasurer could not know it. The amount paid-in was mentioned : payment from National Club 41, without country name and without treasurer name. After the visit from Michael in New Zealand, he could bring back the bank proof and at last Marc could allocate the transfer of their account. Till the HYM, 283,82 Euro, of which 135 Euro for Courier, remained to be paid (Fees calculated with 16 Clubs).
- Sweden owed its fees for 2001-2002 and was ejected of Club 41 International in Copenhagen.
- With South Africa we have a contention that goes back to Freddy Kachelhofer. The delegates of S-A think that the fees before 2001 were always paid in advance, and Freddy says that they never have paid in advance. For the part of Marc Niederlender, 3 years ago, he took the accounts with zero for all Associations. So, South-Africa owed 3 year's fees since 2001, they have paid to the Treasurer 2 fees till Interlaken. Finally, it remains one contribution of 1035,04 Euro. A meeting to find a solution was necessary after the HYM and it was essential to determine the exact number of active Clubs in this Association.
- Romania was updated. All the fees for last year and for the coming year were paid a few minutes before the meeting.
- Finland was updated too. It stays only 6,82 Euro, they are bank charges concerning their last payment.
- Tallinn in Estonia ordered Courier Magazines for 4 Euro. It's paid.

Marc thinks it's not absolutely normal that the volunteers who work for the good running of our Club, who work for building a great Club 41 International have to do it with their own money. He thanks all, when they will be back, for using all there influence for a payment in the beginning of November at last.

Afterwards the Treasurer told that everything was not as dark as it seemed. Some contributions for 2003-2004, the year of President Michael Dalbo Pedersen, were already noted by the Treasurer before the HYM.

For example, Great-Britain and Ireland have paid. Germany, too. Italy has sent out its cheque. Norway, payment was done. Cyprus and Romania have paid. Austria too, of course, and Belgium has sent out its fees. Finland and France declared that the payment was done and the Treasurer was waiting for the confirmation from these two Associations.

Marc was sure, that all others will do what's necessary when going back.

16) Statutes and rules.

The set of rules presented along with the material sent out by Marc Niederlender with the agenda for Interlaken is a proposal of the new statutes and rules. It was sent to all IRO's and National Presidents of each member Association prior to the HYM meeting it was made clear by the International President Michael Dalbo Pedersen that only rule 3a has been dealt with and subsequently ratified in Copenhagen at the AGM. Therefore no proposals concerning this particular issue will be taken into consideration.

In the new set of rules only issues which are directly affected by rule 3a have been changed.

If any member association would like anything else to be altered or changed, added or omitted it can only take place by sending a proposal to the International Secretary Marc Niederlender (Copy to the International President) before February 1st 2004. The proposal/proposals will subsequently be on the agenda in Arras where it/they will be voted on.

- 17) The Vice-President, Alain de la Bretesche told about his programme for 2004 by insisting especially on the necessity to find new means in the form of advertising/sponsoring. A fees rise being not conceivable, all other ideas permitting a better capacity of expenses cover, would be welcome. More money available = more productivity in the board = Club 41 International more attractive/efficient.

18) Directory and Courier

Peter Poech has sent out the same number of directory copies this year as last year. Every Associations have paid. The cheque from France will be returned to the Editor by the International Treasurer next week, and the payment due by Germany will be sent out next week also.

An extension of the content of the Directory was considered for the coming years.

Dieter Straka asked for the number of copies needed by all Associations in the future.

19) Any other business.

- Final accounts of the year 2002-2003, year of President Sam Sampath will be proved in Arras. Jean-Marie de Backer, Belgium, has been designed as Auditor unanimously.
- It was asked to all Associations to take care of their payments before the AGM in order to have the possibility to vote in Arras. This proposal was accepted unanimously.
- Marc Niederlender finishes his term of office in France in June 2004. He presented his candidature for one year extension.

- Dieter Straka and Renato Bonfini were confirmed as Editor and Webmaster for one more year.
- Best wishes to Otto Adelhofer who could not attend the HYM on medical grounds.
- Sent us their best greetings : Ariel Eldor, Otto Adelhofer, Peter Taylor, Paolo Alessi and Joan Damoc.
- Rainer Schichan from Arras, France, presented the next AGM and the programme that will be offered to all guests in June 2004.
- Hubert Braeckmans invited all Associations to Antwerpen for the HYM 2004. He told about the Belgians having problems to find new members, especially Round Table members. - Alain de la Bretesche said that never in an official meeting of Club 41 International Round Table was represented. This situation will be changed in Arras next year. President Michael told he tried to have the International Vice President of Round Table to come to Interlaken but he was at another International meeting.
- Guillaume Emmanuel Eveillard wished that all interested can have the agenda before an International HYM or AGM on request.
- Peter Poech thought that we should do our best for a return of Club 41 International of Sweden. Sam Sampath told him that we have done all our possible in this sad separation and Micheal Dalbo Pedersen confirmed it. The members of the Swedish Association have slowly left the National organisation and Sam added that maybe the time will change the actual situation. The peril is arising because of no presence of Clubs in Sweden, they now have only single members.

- 20) President Pedersen, before closing remarks, thanked all the board members and all the participants for an efficient and fruitful collaboration for the best of Club 41.

- 21) The next meeting, the AGM 2004, will take place on June 04/06, in Arras, France.

Ironman Triathlon Hawaii

What Wimbledon is for the tennis player and Augusta for the Golfer the Ironman Triathlon World Championships on Big Island Hawaii is for the triathlete each year in October.

*The start of the race*

Ironman Triathlon is 3.9 km swimming, 180 km cycling and at the end a marathon run of 42 km. My first start at the Ironman in Klagenfurt in Austria in 1998 was a big challenge to see of a hobby-triathlete like me could complete the distance within the time limit. Me, that's Klaus "Niki" Schedina, member of the Club 41 in Deutschlandsberg in Austria. As an active swimmer and via many different types of sports I started running pretty late. After 10 international marathons I was ready for the adventure of triathlon which found its peak in the year 2002 when I joined my fifth race: winner in the federal state championship, second in the Austrian championship (in the respective age classes) as well as the qualification, and only a qualification will give you a starting place

*Dry outside and inside*

– I was one of 64 starters in my age class, for the world championships in Hawaii.

*foaming waters*

In October 2002 I travelled together with my wife, daughter and son-in-law to the "holy land" of this sport. One week for acclimatisation, easy training, meeting the world elite as well as the probably best trained male and female bodies you can imagine.

19th of October 2002: the big day. After a night of heavy rain and thunderstorms the waves still crash over the quay wall onto the street as we arrive at Kona (start and finish of the race) at 5 a.m. After 20 minutes comes the announcement "start 7:00, Ironmanrace definitely over the full distance". After the obligatory hymn and the starting signal 1,500 swimmers leave the bay of Kailua Kona

out to the open sea, going for the marker after about 2 km and then back over waves of about 1,5 m. After 1 h 29 min. I leave the water feeling a bit uneasy in the stomach (I already left behind a bit of the breakfast during the swim). Change clothes, run out of the changing zone with the bike and on the highway for the next 180 km.

At the start a bit of rain but then the sun comes out and it keeps on getting hotter. The humidity goes up to 90% during the day. The hilly cycling track leads up a small mountain to the northern turn around point to Hawi. On the way back the feared wind starts blowing stronger and stronger.

*It is only a marathon.....*

At the decent from Hawi gusty from the side and on the last 60 km back to Kona like in a wind tunnel with 40 to 60 km/h from the front which ruins the hope for a good time on the cycling course.

At 6:19 this part is also finished and only the marathon to go. In the meantime it is afternoon, the temperature is 40 degrees Celsius and the marathon track, which goes through the lava fields, doesn't provide any shadow. So it is very important to drink, at the end of the day

it must have been about 14 litres, ice and cold water to cool the body.

*On the run...**everybody is a WINNER*

As I arrive back at Kailua Kona it is already dark, but the finish with a crowd of thousands of spectators makes up for this pretty exhausting day. After 12 hours and 51 minutes I cross the finish line of the best known and infamous endurance sport event on this planet.....

Biking Across the Desert

There we have to go... Colorado River.

Some time ago we went with Franz Spilauer (Winner of the Race Across America 1988) to the south-west of the U.S., that is to Moab for mountain biking. Moab is considered the paradise of mountain biking. Besides the "Slick Rocks" there are numerous mountain bike trails and opportunities to go by bike from 1200m up to 3100 m and to ride down untouched single trails.

During this bike trip we went for three days in groups of ten bikers across the desert, the so-called "white rim" trail. This is the area of the Colorado Valley between Dead Horse Point and the confluence of Green River and

we put up our tents and let ourselves spoil by the guides of the organization "Western spirits" with a sumptuous dinner with delicious salads, beans stew, grilled steaks and iced drinks such as beer, beer, and beer at the camp fire. After that we enjoyed a well deserved sleep.

Early in the morning the sun woke us in our one man tents and we enjoyed the most wonderful sunrise in the desert, which made us aware of the undescribable beauty of nature. After an opulent breakfast we mounted our bikes and set our for the hills, canyons and valleys on the "white rim".

In the evening we fell asleep in our tents completely exhausted. Unfortunately we had run out of beer and were forced to drink normal water for nutrition.

The "third" day brought us back to civilization and we ended the "tour" with a rafting trip on the Colorado.

Although we had enough to drink during those three days, back to Moab we immediately stormed the "Mc Stiffs" to cure our dehydration with several "pitchers of beer" till we were overcome by exhaustion.

The trip across the desert in complete solitude, relying only on ourselves and our bikes (and on the supply truck), will be in our minds forever as a unique borderline experience.

After that we cooled off from the hot and dry desert climate in the dirty waters of the river. To cool down inside beer was flowing in quantities.

In the evening of the first day after almost 7 to 8 hours of biking

The journey was as divers as the country, through which it led, not always pleasant, yet at all times interesting. Not even being 16 at this time, have many an impression, which until today has not faded.

Our group consisted predominantly of Germans and French, the rest being some people from Belgium and me. Looking back now, I have to say that 16 might have been too young an age for this group, however, we got along fairly well and spent much happy time together.

Beginning my voyage with a self-inflicted delay of one day, I at least saved myself a flight with Air India... which has been said to have been very exciting. Even the night's cooler climate was dreadful, after spending so much time in planes, airports and hotels equipped with AC.

As far as for the Indian perception of punctuality a made my first acquaintance, however, I have to admit that it can be of great difficulty to proceed trough the streets of an Indian metropolis within a predicted time span. I even got to know some nocturnal beings too, mainly lizards and wild dogs, prowling the streets. It really was not easy for somebody like me, who had been living under wealthy conditions and until a certain degree protected from life's realities, to absorb what he was to see in India. The simplicity of the majority of the people, the omnipresence of misery, to be gazed at in the streets, the country's sheer size, filthiness and activity, which stood in such a contrast to my small,

quiet and mostly clean little country of birth, all of this was quite overwhelming at the beginning.

Yet one can get used to just about everything, and ultimately, one has to learn close one's mind and eyes, for one's own sake and emotional balance, for the utter magnitude of despair degrades every thought of deliverance to pure ridiculousness.

For all its suffering, India is still a beautiful country, full of unique buildings, wonders and secrets. Its picturesque foreignness can incite within the travelling western guest deep uneasiness as easily true admiration and profound delight.

Our host, however, have been in every case of immense friendliness and exceeding kindness, harbouring and caring for me and my comrades to our very best.

Experiences made in India will to a certain degree be in my mind forever, the hardship of our journey as well as the wonderful impressions, much, which now seems funny, but which has been annoying or intimidating at this time. And never shall I forget, of what up to this time I had hardly been conscious of there is a world apart from western luxury, western values, western problems, where the question is not if there is anything on TV today, but if there is any food today.

When reading through things I have written those days, I think back with wonder, have I really thought that, said that, did I really do that?

The trip to India was I first step towards reality, a first agitation for my mind. I have changed a great deal over the last two years and certainly this journey has had a great share of this, I recognise the roots of many of my beliefs nowadays within the journals written in those times.

Dr. Einhart Melzer wurde im Jahre 1956 Mitglied von RT 5 Berlin. Am dortigen Tisch war er mehrere Jahre Präsident, und er bekleidete während seiner tablerischen Jugendzeit auch das Amt des Vizepräsidenten von RTD. In den 50er-Jahren hatte er noch die Gelegenheit, mit dem Gründer von Round Table, dem Briten Louis Marchesi, zusammen zu kommen.

Im April 1965 gründet Einhart in seiner Berliner Wohnung in der Berliner Straße 85 in B-Zehlendorf den ersten deutschen Club von Ex-Tablern "Club 41 Berlin 1", später in "OT 1 Berlin" umbenannt. Die Gründung der nationalen Vereinigung erfolgt 1969, wiederum in Berlin. In Anlehnung an den Club der "LONDON OLD TABLERS SOCIETY" wird 1970 beim AGM in Leer die Bezeichnung Old Tablers Deutschland – OTD in der Satzung fest geschrieben. Einhart bleibt Präsident von 1969 bis 1972 und wird es erneut 1976/77.

Weitere Ämter füllt Einhart mit großem Engagement aus; so war er Vizepräsident der Association of Ex-Tablers, Präsident von 41-International sowie vieljähriger nationaler IRO von OTD, womit seine besondere Hingabe zur Pflege intensiver internationalen Kontakte deutlich wird.

Zu den Auszeichnungen für sein Eintreten für die Gemeinschaft gehören die Ehrenmitgliedschaften bei OTD ebenso wie bei 41-International.

Am 24. Mai 2003 stand der 80. Geburtstag von Einhart an, den er in Berlin mit seinen Freunden aus dem Berliner OT-Umfeld gefeiert wurde.

Im Berliner Stadtteil Mariendorf liegt sein neues Domizil, eine Residenz in bevorzugter Wohnlage mit einzigartiger Aussicht. Von hier wird Einhart mit Annelies auch zukünftig aufbrechen, um den vielen Freunden, die ein national wie international so intensives Extabler-Leben zur Folge hat, weiterhin zu begegnen und die Freundschaften zu pflegen. Wir alle, seine Freunde, können mit den Beiden weiterhin unter der bisherigen Telefon- und Fax-Nummer Kontakt halten.

First Old Tablers Club founded in Kathmandu, Nepal - An Extension by Old Tablers Germany

The traditionally good relationship between Round Table Germany and Round Table Nepal was the reason for last year's enginery by a group of ex-tablers from Kathmandu asking the Old Tablers of Germany (OTD) for help and support the foundation of the first Old Tablers in club in Nepal.

In the following months an intensive correspondence started between IRO Ulver Oswald from OTD and ex-tabler Vinod Dharewa. Questions, how to precede were cleared and hints on the foundation-modalities were given. Finally, the formal conditions for a successful foundation of a new club at Nepal were fulfilled. Next step was to find a fixed date for the foundation event.

This turned out to be the 11th August, the day on which the Shangri-La-Mass-Tour came to the end. Round Table Nepal has been offering this Mass-Tour to all tablers of the world for years. Hence there was a chance to have the foundation-ceremony in attendance of the international audience of Round and Old Tablers. For the festival environment the banqueting hall of Radisson Hotel in Kathmandu was chosen. So Ulver Oswald could welcome the guests in presence of all foundation-members with their families, a lot of round tablers from Kathmandu and surroundings as well as the participants of the mass-tour. In his speech Ulver Oswald referred to the basis structures of the club organisation, which don't differ too much from the structures of Round Table, and to the aims of objects from Old Tablers. The German IRO pointed to the worldwide growth of the Club family to which OT Nepal will join when charter takes place in the near future.

As our RT Clubs are located all over Estonia, it was really difficult to found first OT-club. In Tallinn we have 4 different RT clubs, thus we were also the first to have enough men over 40 to start with 41 club in Tallinn.

And the Ex-tablers had their first meeting in Tallinn on September 13th 2000 at 6

And the second important date in Estonian round table movement - on October 13th 2001 was celebrated the Charter of the first OT club in Estonia - OT- 1 Tallinn.

Urmas Raidma in 2002-2003
Innar Rohtla in 2003 - 2004 .

In all our activities we follow the basic principles and values of international RT movement – we want improve and influence on everybody's life around us. We aim on continuance and there will be more OT-clubs in Estonia in the nearest future.
