For instance, they had a 1300 Euro bottle of Champagne - the biggest I've ever seen! The meeting was held separately in the hotel nightclub and was one of the funniest and most intense I've ever attended. We, all the guests, could feel the great enthusiasm and freshness which was present all the time at all events from home parties on Friday till the big Gala evening in a vast tent built in the centre of the city. Per Wigart and his team had done a fantastic job to build the Swedish OT up again after a long period of absence from international action. Now, they have some 450 members and 34 clubs and according to the board it will be doubled in no time. I as a Finn am very happy for the success of our neighbours and was very proud of the fact that five of them made their way to Jyväskylä via Copenhagen and Turku despite the volcanic cloud which disturbed air traffic. Also the ferries were fully booked, so they had to make their way to Finland by the most difficult route. I wish the Swedish Old Tablers all the best in the years to come and trust it will be amongst the most successful National Associations under the 41 International wings.

My second visit headed for Italy and Bologna. The beautiful city of Bologna, city of towers and pavements, welcomed us with open arms and embraced us with fine weather and a very cosy event. I had never been to Bologna before but I'd read a book about the town some years ago. It was exactly as described and fulfilled all my expectations. Augusto Ferrari and the local organisers had done a great job. After the meeting we visited the Ducati factory which is the pride of Bologna just like the Ferrari in Maranello. Very interesting for a biker like me.

The earthquake project in Abruzzo Onna has been very successful and showed us all what friendship can do.

Christian Roessel carries on as the President of the Austrian 41 Association. The size of Austria is also very stable with 31 clubs and over 700 members.




Thanks to all the organisers. Thanks for the friendship. It's been good fun.





Why, Duccio asked simply, don't we extend this friendship for regular meetings, occasionally for the AGMs and also once a year outside the official events.





We finish the brunch with a firm promise of Richard and his wife from RTBI to join the Swiss AGM, and travel home, keeping wonderful memories.



Despite this, many have felt that it is just a group of people that are part of an organisation, just having fun. Most don't realize how deep is the ethos of tabling and how much it means to the people who are part of this group and the culture that is the essence of tabling.



I would like to share a recent experience of mine in Europe,

which is a very compelling reason why Tablers are a unique fraternity whose members are one of the most selfless, fun loving and dependable friends that one can find in any place.

On 13th April, I travelled to Europe – Milan to be precise - to attend the International Furniture Fair, which has an attendance of more than 400,000 people from across the world. Usually all hotels in Milan are sold out because of the fair. I had a return flight back to India, via Frankfurt on the 17th. On the 15th, I heard the news that there had been a volcanic eruption in Iceland and the ash from this volcano was spreading all across Europe and hence was posing a big problem for high flying aircrafts. Immediately, the entire airspace all over Europe was shut down and all the flights were grounded. I was hoping that it would ease by the 17th, but it was not to be. I had a hotel reservation till the 17th, on the



morning of which I checked and headed towards the airport to take my chances there.

There was complete chaos at Milan airport. I was told that all flights had been cancelled indefinitely, and nobody knew when the airports would open again and the flights would resume. I saw passengers standing totally lost, mothers with their children worried about what to do next. I didn't have a hotel room and because of the furniture fair, hundreds of thousands of people were stranded in Milan, many with no hotel rooms. The earliest flight that was supposed to take off was on the 20th (provided the airports opened across Europe), but there was no clarity on my reservation. I immediately decided that the best option for me was to somehow get to Frankfurt and take my chances to get a seat on the first available flight to India. Then I found out that there were no seats available on

a single train or bus headed towards N. Europe. They were completely sold out. I even tried to rent a self driven car to get to Frankfurt, but all Car Rental agencies were doing roaring business during this chaos and didn't have a single car available. Taxis were having a field day by charging upwards of 1700 Euros per person on a one-way trip to Frankfurt, which was completely ridiculous. In this situation, I stood there completely lost for ideas and had absolutely no idea how long I would be stranded in Europe as the airline (Lufthansa) threw all sorts of dates for a flight for me. They didn't offer any accommodation or food. To compound my problems, my Shengen Visa was valid only till 21st April.

At this stage, I called up my Round Table friend in India – Anil Kesavan and casually spoke about my problem to him. He in turn informed Gopal Chopra, who wasted no time in flashing an SOS on the E-groups of Round Table and the 41ers of India, informing everybody about my predicament. In less than an hour, I was getting calls from all over India from Tablers, friends and relations of Tablers and 41ers in India & Italy, offering help. From a complete no hope situation, I was swamped with help from all corners and I was suddenly in a strange situation and a dilemma where I had to decide whose hospitality I could enjoy during this period of distress. The help and kindness was beyond comparison. Pradeep, our President of the 41ers Club, was continuously in touch with me, to offer all help possible.

Meanwhile, another 41er from the South of France (Emmanuel Krutten) got to know about this through Anil Chikkara (Club 116) and insisted on driving down from Nice to Milan to pick me up and take me back to his house, a further 60 kms away from Nice, and put me up till this problem was resolved. Let me add that it was a good 4½ hour drive in one direction and he still insisted on not taking no for an answer. I agreed to his offer, but insisted that I would take a train from Milan to Nice and that he could instead meet me there, which he did. Meanwhile Lufthansa confirmed the return ticket for the 24th from Frankfurt, which was the earliest possible. Still, I was relieved as I finally had a confirmed date, though a bit late.



From this point onwards, I had a great time in France, visiting Nice, Sant Tropez, Toulon, Cannes, etc thanks to Emmanuel. He and his family were amazing hosts and spared nothing to make my stay comfortable. He even had a few of his friends come over and we had some great barbecue parties too. For some time, I even forgot that I was actually stranded on a



different continent. Two days later, (on the 22nd) I took a train and went 800 kms to the North of France (and then headed towards Frankfurt) and met up with another 41er – Pierre Frank, who was a past President of Round Table France. Even though it was a weekday, and he was extremely busy with various business activities, he still took time off to spend time with me. On 23rd I went along with Pierre to Luxembourg and he then drove me all the way to Frankfurt, just to drop me at the airport – a full 560 kms both ways. He requested me to call him, if there was any further trouble and, should I need his help, he would be available. Thankfully, I didn't have to trouble Pierre any further. All I can say, is that I was virtually floored by the warmth and friendship extended by various wonderful people who briefly touched my life to make my entire experience turn from a disaster, to a pleasant and memorable experience.

I cannot give a better example but share my own experience to show the power of tabling and how it helps to be a part of this wonderful worldwide organisation that we are all part of. Over 83,000 flights were grounded and millions of passengers worldwide were affected like me, but at least, thanks to Round Table, and the wonderful people that I met, my experience was pleasant and also something to be cherished. At the Frankfurt airport, I did have some trouble with my expired Visa at Passport control, but after I explained my reason (it was obvious), a bit of documentation and 30 minutes with the police, along with 100s of other passengers with similar problems, I was allowed to leave Frankfurt airport for India. As I proceeded to board the aircraft, I noticed 100s of people still sleeping in the hallways of the airport (for many days) on beds provided by the airport authorities, waiting for their turn to get back home. I was just



grateful that I was not part of that crowd thanks to Round Table and the 41ers group, which helped me get friends across continents, who will never allow their friends and families to be in trouble when they are around.

Many people have always wondered what tabling is all about and whether it is worth joining this organisation. I sincerely feel that young people should join and be a part of this worldwide group and benefit from the friendship and cultural mix that it brings into our life. During our travels and busy schedule, we are sure to find some time where we can meet new friends in the far corners of this world. But most importantly and be rest assured, in times of need never hesitate to call a Tabler anywhere in the world as he will help and give you the comfort, security and experience of a family away from home, without expecting anything in return. That is the power of Round Table. I can definitely vouch for that.

Hi, Salut and Bon Jour,





He refused to understand that the beneficiary would be after 3 years. I met him several times thereafter and he was very understanding.

At the farewell brunch in Trieste, after I took over as 41 International President, Frank Baker along with the other British delegates asked me throw out the French Association from 41 International because they still accepted non-tablers. They refused to realise that I did not have such powers. They replied that they were leaving 41International. Everyone was shocked and fully appreciated my predicament. Only the previous day the French had agreed to revamp their rules and agreed that a non-tabler would not be their representative on the International Board. Also that we would be known as an organisation of ex-tablers and the new 41 International Treasurer was Guy Mercier from France. Eihnhart then went to UK and mustered support to re-join, which they did a few years later. My regret is that I never went to Berlin, in spite of an invitation. And the most memorable was our Mass tour of Norway. He was great fun and always an optimist and Anneliese was always by his side.
