### Why you should book early

Conference-goers will stay in excellent hotels, the Novotel or the City Inn, next to each other and about five minutes walk from the British Empire and Commonwealth Museum which is at Temple Meads mainline station. Prices for each are the same.

Just complete and send off the enclosed registration form for a 3-day (Thursday to Sunday), 2-day (Friday to Sunday) or 1-day (Friday to Saturday or Saturday to Sunday) stay and any optional extras.

**Important:** more than ever, forward planning pays off. By booking an accommodation package before October 31st 2005 you will avoid the "late booking" premium of £20, and get the package you want. Because we shall then be selling stand-alone tickets for evening events to clubs within about an hour's drive.

We want to encourage more 41ers to have fun at national conferences - that's why the event moves round the country each year. Overnight stays are a key part of the package, but we know that people living locally may not need a hotel if they can get home safely after an evening event. This year evening event tickets will be available from November 1st - but only to members of the clubs listed below (which are within about one hour's travelling time of Bristol - this has been set at 30 miles, except where good road communications allow it to be extended).

Unfortunately we can only accommodate some 300 couples at our venue, even though it's the biggest and best in the area. So book early as it will be first come, first served, with priority given to package purchasers until October 31st.

In November we will confirm any requests we have had from members of local clubs for standalone tickets for evening events. But we strongly recommend that members of these clubs book a package to make sure they get a confirmed booking. Both packages and stand-alone tickets will of course remain on sale.

At the end of January any unbooked rooms will be handed back to the hotels to avoid incurring penalties. So after that date any late bookings will be subject to availability, and accommodation prices may alter.

So - book early to make sure you and your friends get to the events you want.

## An Antipodean Adventure otherwise known as the 41 Club Trip to New Zealand 2005

## A Report by Lawrence Bamber, National Councillor - Region 15

Last February/March an expectant group of 41ers, Tangent Members and Partners ventured forth across the Equator to tour New Zealand and meet up with members of New Zealand 41 Club and Tangent. The party met for the first time in the morning of Saturday, 19th February when all thirty-two boarded our luxury coach which was to be our transport for the next four weeks. There were representatives from England, North and South Ireland, Scotland, Wales and Germany.

On leaving Auckland we progressed North to a beautiful area on the North-east Coast of North Island known as the Bay of Islands. We stayed here for two nights and indulged in dolphin watching, cruising, walking around Russell. A Welcome Dinner was held at Waitangi where the Treaty (of Waitangi) was signed between the United Kingdom and the Maoris. This Treaty is the founding document of modern New Zealand.

From the Bay of Islands we travelled south, back via Auckland. We stayed in Rotorua for two nights and spent time visiting the geothermal reserves, the Maori Arts and Crafts Institute, the Buried Village. The highlight was a Maori Dinner and folk concert at which our UK tour leader, Brian Metcalf, took on the role of a Maori chief - complete with nose rubbing!

Following our stopover in Rotorua we travelled through wine country. Our day out with our Napier hosts included a walking tour around the town, the inevitable visit to one or two wineries and an interesting tractor tour round a fruit farm with optional fruity ice-cream! From Napier we travelled south to Wellington - the capital of New Zealand - where we were hosted for two nights by Upper Hutt 41 Club. The Club, together with their daughter Table, hold meetings in an Eighteenth Century building known as the Blockhouse which was originally built as a fort to defend the Brits from the Maoris and to protect the road to Wellington. Our day out with the hosts involved a grand tour of Wellington, including the Beehive (Parliament Building), the old cable car, Mount Victoria and the amazing Te Papa Museum of New Zealand, complete with simulated earthquakes! The following morning we all boarded the coach to go by ferry from Wellington Harbour, across the Cook Strait to the South Island Harbour of Picton. A short drive from Picton is Blenheim, in the heart of New Zealand's wine growing region. Needless to say, we were hosted there for two nights by Blenheim 41 Club. Our day out with our hosts included visits to many of the top wineries: Cloudy Bay, Montana, Hawkesbridge and Marlborough.

From Blenheim we travelled via Havelock to our next group of hosts from Nelson and Motueka.. As it was 1st March - St. David's Day - Welsh Dragons abounded on the bus and the Welsh contingent made a good attempt at the Welsh National Anthem. The highlight of our two-night stay with our hosts in Nelson/Motueka was a visit to the Abel Tasman National Park.

An early start was required the following morning as we had a long drive down the West Coast of South Island to our destination for two nights at Fox Glacier which, as the name implies, is in New Zealand's Alpine region. Following our two days in the Alpine region, we continued down the West Coast to Queenstown - the adventure capital of New Zealand. Our two-night stay in Queenstown involved a multiplicity of activities, including more jet boating, fishing, sightseeing and a ride on the gondola/cable car for lunch and/or dinner overlooking Queenstown and Lake Wakatipu. But the highlight of the stay in Queenstown was the evening dinner cruise aboard TSS Earnslaw, a coal-fired steamship. From Queenstown we ventured south-east to Gore where some were being hosted by Gore 41 Club. The remainder travelled even further south to Invercargill to be hosted by Invercargill 41 Club. As we could go no further



south - at least not with the coach - we turned north (still on South Island) and made for Alexandra in Central Otago. It was very hot when we got there on the first day/night of our stay but on leaving after the second night, there was snow on the hills and the temperature had dropped by 20°C. Definitely not the weather for shorts! During our day out with our hosts we toured the local vineries as this is another of New Zealand's wine-producing regions.

Our final hosting was by Ashburton 41 Club which is between Timaru and Christchurch. Here we visited the Canterbury Plains and the surrounding mountains such as Mount Hutt. Onwards to Christchurch where one of the highlights was a visit to the International Antarctic Centre at Christchurch Airport. Others included a ride on the vintage tram system, the view from the top of Mount Vernon. and Cathedral Square, complete with its own Wizard and large chess set. A trip to Kaikoura for whale watching was not disappointing, as we saw three gigantic sperm whales resting on the surface before spectacularly arching their bodies and diving into the depths with the customary tail fin the last part to be seen. Truly amazing! Our final night dinner/party was held in the restaurant at the top of the Christchurch Gondola. After dinner the Tour Oscar Awards was hosted by Brian and Lady Sue Metcalf, ably assisted by Sir Lawrence of Poynton. We were joined at the Dinner by Peter and Margaret Butchart, Phil Harris our New Zealand travel agent, and other representatives of New Zealand 41 Club.

## Thames Swim 2005 - Andy Nation

Welwyn 41 Club Vice Chairman, Andy Nation, plans to set a new World record by being the first person ever to swim the entire 215 mile length of the River Thames. He set his target back in February 2004 when he decided it was time for another fund raiser. Not content with simply doing the London to Brighton Bike Ride again, he looked for something more original and spectacular.

He is currently training by swimming a mile every day and will be increasing that to 3 miles/day to build up the stamina he will need for the event. On the fund raising side he currently has sponsorship of nearly £9,000 but this is increasing daily. You can check on the current state of play by visiting the Thames Swim 2005 website at <a href="https://www.thamesswim.org">www.thamesswim.org</a> You can also see TV and hear radio interviews on the media page of the website.

The swim is equivalent to 10 English Channel crossings or 8 marathons and Andy is hoping to finish the event in 14 days if he can average 15 miles per day. He will be fortunate to be escorted on the non-tidal section of the River by canoeists from the Lifeguard Section of the British Canoe Union. Once he gets to Teddington Lock the River is tidal and his escort will then be Stewart Warren, also a Welwyn 41 Club member, and Tanya Reynolds in a rigid inflatable boat (RIB).

The logistics of putting together such an event are considerable. Besides the daily training and fund raising, there's obtaining relevant permissions, organizing overnight accommodation, escort craft, transportation, signage, website updates, press, radio and TV interviews. It's pretty much a full-time job on top of his need to maintain a regular income.

### "The Scottish Concorde"



East Lothian is not the sort of place to visit if you are after the high life, nightclubs or anything more exhilarating than a brisk walk. It is a backwater of Scotland where families come on holiday to relax and unwind. We locals generally keep pretty quiet about the place because we don't want to spoil things. Around here we have mile upon mile of unspoilt beaches, lovely walks, castles, our own distillery, little harbours for the boating fraternity, museums, dozens of fine eating hostelries and numerous really excellent golf courses including of course, Muirfield.

#### - Oh, and we also have a Concorde!

Yes, this neck of the woods was chosen as the new home of Concorde Alpha-Alpha – the first Concorde to go into commercial use back in 1969 and the one that made the inaugural flight from Heathrow to New York. It is common knowledge that as a result of the tragic Paris air disaster in July 2000, the Concorde fleet was eventually grounded. However, it was decided to put one on permanent display here in Scotland.

Housed at the Museum of Flight at East Fortune Aerodrome near Haddington, and about four miles inland from here, this wonderful piece of Anglo/French engineering has now been reassembled after a mammoth logistics exercise. This saw her moved from Heathrow by road to the Thames, by barge up the east coast to Torness Power Station, then along about 12 miles of the A1 and finally over 2 miles of fields to her final resting place.

In March her hanger was opened for the first time to the public so it was an obvious venue for an April joint meeting between North Berwick & District 41 Club and North Berwick & District Round Table. As it happens, it was the first evening that the Museum had opened their doors to an organised group visit to Concorde and we were used as guinea pigs in their plans to encourage corporate clients in the future.

They have no need to worry. They treated us very well indeed with a full programme, which included an introduction by **Alistair Dodds**, Director of Museums - Scotland, who oversaw the moving and installation of Alpha-Alpha in her new home. We enjoyed a film, which traced the history of the Concorde Project, an opportunity to look round the aircraft and a browse around the static exhibition. We were also treated to an excellent buffet and **North Berwick Round Table** took full advantage of the situation by inducting a new member on the aircraft itself. Surely a first - me thinks. At the same ceremony, they also welcomed **Keith Barbour**, a member of **North Berwick 41** Club as their new **Honorary President for 2005/06**.

If you ever get the opportunity to visit this wonderful part of Britain, don't go home without seeing what is fast becoming our pride and joy. But please be quiet. We don't rush about too much in these parts and this Concorde thing is more than enough for us right now.
