As you are aware, Malcolm and Dorothy were members of the group of G.B. & I. (along with a couple from Germany) 41'ers who visited New Zealand in February and March of this year. While they were not actually staying with us while in our area, Margaret and I did have the pleasure of having Dorothy and Malcolm here for an evening during their stay:

Then at the end of the tour, we travelled south to Christchurch and shared a wonderful evening with the group - it just happened to be St. Patrick's Day - so you can guess who was the life and soul of the party - yes, Malcolm Banks. When we received word from Singapore that he was in hospital there, we faxed them daily, trying to keep a reasonable perspective on things, but when we heard the results of the scan, and his susbsequent admission to hospital on his return to Dublin, sadly, reality took over

On a personal note, Makolm's favourite thing to tell me was that the two beers he bought me in Dublin last year, were the most expensive two beers he had ever bought they finished up costing him over £7000 - two beers and two trips to New Zealand !!!! With the Council Meeting in Abergavenny in June now just a memory and the Second National Council Meeting in the Midlands just a few weeks ago; where is the year going? I am extremely pleased to be able to report that common sense did prevail at the Special General Meeting when Council proposed a change in the rules to secure the continuity of the Presidency for the Association. Ian Mackenzie our Vice President appointed under the National Rules in Abergavenny ensure a smooth handover next April when we get to Bristol. May I take this opportunity and thank all of the clubs who attended the SGM and for the way in which they all conducted themselves throughout the meeting and the Council Meeting as well.



Forward Planning has unveiled a radical restructuring plan for National Council and a way forward for our Association; the plan was well received by the National Executive and Council have been given the details to digest and come back to the next Council Meeting in February where the ideas will be debated fully. The Plan is in my opinion, a real opportunity to create the correct framework for our Association going forward; finances alone will not provide a future for the current structure and unless we link our Association on a more meaningful basis with RTBI; we will struggle to survive.

I attended the 5th meeting of the prospective new club of Round Table 717 Monmouth which is due to charter on 12th January 2006 followed by Monmouth 41 Club. The reformation of Monmouth has come about following the involvement of Kevin Hughes from Barry RT who now lives in Monmouth and the Area 4 Executive; I believe a similar approach is being made in Sutton Coldfield as well as two other clubs due to re-charter. We are hoping to re-charter Monmouth 41 Club as well; so I will keep you posted.

Cannock's 40th Charter night proved to be huge success who were joined on the night by Past President of RTBI, Roger Nicholls and colleagues from Penkridge before I headed back home to journey on to Heathrow to catch my early flight to Region 20 and the Iberian Cluster Weekend in Gibraltar, my thanks to Andrew and Sally Cooper for accompanying Diane and I to the Iberian Experience and an opportunity to see what monkeys do when they get bored 'up the Rock'; they will know what I mean!

Since Durban I have been quite busy although the summer months are rather less hectic than those ahead. A dozen or so 41ers from overseas attended the DJL and were amazed at the atmosphere generated by the occasion. At the recent HYM in Cyprus, John Hudson, the 41 International President commented on the day and said only the British could organise such an event. Praise indeed! In early June I attended the OTD AGM in Karlsruhe, Germany when Bob Parton, an Englishman took over as their National President. The "boys" from the 18 strong GBI contingent staged an interruption based on a "Dolly Parton" theme. Blond wigs and plastic boobs were very much to the fore! I am not sure if many of those present knew who Dolly was but they soon got the message. Andy Waite went to the French AGM in Nantes plus the WOCO conference in Costa Rica. Also in July I represented Mike Fitchett (not as his double) at the prize giving on the Region 18 Golf Day in Bristol, my thanks to Bruce Poole and his "lads" for their hospitality. Soon afterwards I attended a meeting of the Bristol Conference Committee. There will be an International Lunch in Bristol on Thursday 27th April. In the past these lunches have been one of the highlights of our conferences so why not come along? If your club has overseas contacts invite them over. They are great fellowship events.

August was quiet but in September I went to the Region 7 Forum organised by Lichfield 41 Club. This was not so quiet but fellowship did come out on top! Early October found me at the 41 International HYM in Cyprus where the sun shone, the temperature was 29 degrees and there were many attempts at "Zorba's" dance. We thought we were good at the time. On the Friday prior to the meeting many of us went on a day's outing to see some of the local "sights" and "sites". We visited an old Crusader's castle, the Aphrodite rocks and then an ancient monastery. The latter involved a trip down the hillside in an old Bedford coach(Vintage 1960?), a glass or two of wine and/or local firewater, better suited as paint stripper and then a 25 minute donkey ride to the monastery, AND 25 MINUTES BACK! After the donkeys Aphrodite was the last person that we thought of and it should be noted that at Saturday's meeting most delegates stood up when speaking!

The actual HYM, attended by approximately 40 delegates (including 7 from GBI) from 14 counties, was opened by John Hudson and he gave a report on his travels to date. He certainly has to cover some miles especially as his home is in South Africa. Our own John Bellwood again kept the meeting running smoothly and read his usual letter from the Queen. This time he did not wear a funny hat, I can only conclude that HM did not have one to spare. John presented his budget and accounts and gave advance notice that sometime in the future fees may have to rise as will the method of charging the various associations. We will watch this very carefully. There was also a proposal to make some cosmetic changes to the rules. This looks fairly harmless but they will be looked at by Council and of course any changes must be ratified at our own AGM and by the other associations. All of this will be a long and drawn out process so watch this space but do not hold your breath. GBI indicated that it would like to host the International Vice-Presidency in 2008/9. You will recall from my last Magazine article that we previously withdrew our offer for 2007/8 until a candidate has been elected at the Bristol AGM. You will receive more on this from Martin Green. I am grateful to John Clegg who acted as our second voting delegate. The meeting lasted almost four hours.

In marked contrast, the **Iberian Cluster** meeting, also in October, lasted 20 minutes! The previous year it lasted only 15. There was a goodly bunch from GBI led by **National President Mike** and **Vice-President Ian plus Tangent National President Judy**. The only topic was to decide who was going to organise the **2006 Cluster**. Costa del Sol club, chaired by **Gareth George** (Past RTBI National President and ex- member of Billericay RT) was "selected" from a shortlist of 1. What a surprise to find that Gareth already had some pre-printed leaflets for 2006 in his file! The rest of the time was spent exploring the "**Rock**" and eating paella except for the final Gala evening which took place in the Casino overlooking the harbour. The **Torch of Friendship** was paraded around the room by **John Tewksbury**, **Chairman 41 Club Gibraltar and Paul Vicktor**, **Chairman RT Gibraltar**. Ian and I explained to the airport security and customs that it was an ornament!! It was a great weekend and we also sold a few books and some ties!

Looking ahead, I will be attending the Swiss 41Club AGM in St. Gallen and the Italian "Chestnut" festival in Merano, both in early November. I have received an invite from 41 Club Lagos to go to Nigeria but time and budgets force me to give it a miss on this occasion. However should any GBI members be in Nigeria at any time they would be pleased to see you. Next year we can look forward to the Finish AGM in March, the Danish AGM in "Hamlets" castle at Elsinore and the Euroski week in Obertauren, Austria. On 6/7/8th of May Calpe 41 Club, Spain, will hold their Charter. The list goes on! Why not join in, "International " is fun.

Lastly, plans for the HYM of 41 International, to be held in Southend-on-Sea from 13th/15th October 2006 are well in hand. The Gala dinner will be held at the House of Commons and Gill Young has put together a wonderful pre-tour. Brochures are available. 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A new 41 Club hits Spain's Costa Blanca

It's nearly 20 years since the Costa Blanca club was chartered, and they continue to thrive, based in the resort of Javea. The number of past tablers living in or visiting this beautiful part of Spain is hard to determine, but the potential certainly exists to bring 41 to other areas. Currently, as well as the club based in Javea, there are others in Majorca, on the Costa del Sol, and nearby Nerja, in Gibraltar and in Portugal. Annually these clubs meet in "Cluster" – this year hosted by the club in Gibraltar. And they have amongst them members of the newly formed Calpe and District club. Calpe is one of the principle towns of the northern Costa Blanca in Valencia region, and around 15 miles south of Javea.

The first meeting was held in May this year and already a dozen members have signed up, with nearly as many others expressing interest. We meet for lunch on the third Thursday of each month in one of Calpe's renowned fine restaurants – but of course we pay the very attractive Spanish prices (under £10 including wine!) – and we welcome resident, semi-resident and visiting 41 clubbers. Our Charter presentation ceremony is planned as part of a weekend of activities in early May 2006 (5th, 6th and 7th) and of course we have negotiated excellent prices with the key hotel and other venue. In fact just 120.50 (£85) for a two night package in the best hotel in town, including the main events. Attendees just have to get here and with budget airlines flying to Alicante and Valencia from every conceivable UK airport that could hardly be easier!

Perth 41 Club (the only one in Australia)

Starting with the Club's 20th Anniversary Charter Dinner in July 2004, the Club has pursued a very active Social Programme to which further reference is made below. 
60 years

It started as an idea in February last year - it culminated in a rousing reception and a new World record at Teddington Lock on the 14th August 2005. What an adventure! I have met some amazingly kind and generous people. Dave Messenger and his daughter, Sarah-Jane from the BCU Lifeguards were excellent river escorts. My wife Lieva was my land escort and Mike Styles, Chairman of Welwyn 41 Club, volunteered to be my general factorum. Although not a 41 Club event, 41 Clubs all along the Thames valley have hosted the Thames Swim team and made us feel most welcome. The night before the start, we were hosted by Richard & Shirley Bell and Rory & Sandy Gear – Farringdon and District 41 Club – who organised a splendid BBQ with other members from their Club also invited. Regretfully, an early night in preparation for our 5:15am alarm call. Captain Geoff Pritchard ferried the team upriver from Lechlade Marina to the start point at The Round house, Inglesham in his fine new boat. Here, in Gloucestershire, the Thames meets the River Colne and the Thames Severn Canal. A chilly start most appreciated by Hertbeat Radio roving reporter, Euan Tees, who decided to give the 'Hertbeat Speedos' a dunking (see the pics on the website link on www.thamesswim.org).

The first day's swimming was briefly interrupted mid-day by the ITN news crew who wanted to do an interview. The cameraman nearly persuaded the lady interviewer to don my spare swimskin and join me in the water but she changed her mind at the last minute. During the actual interview a local goose took a liking to me and decided to sit on my lap during the interview. I don't know whether that bit was broadcast but perhaps any reader who saw it can let me know. Back to the swim and on that first day I completed 17.5 miles, finishing at Newbridge. The cold and exhaustion had got to me by the end of the day and the bouts of sweats and shivers made me feel so unwell I couldn't eat my evening meal. In bed by 9:30pm. 


As the Region prepares for the Torch Event which will have taken place when the magazine reaches you it is time to reflect on what has happened in the last month or so.

To whom it may concern

Three times in the last 10 years delegates to an AGM have considered the 'Non Ex-Tabler' issue.

In 1996 the Golden Jubilee Committee recommendation not to accept any more non Ex-Tablers was fully endorsed and Councillors agreed that it was their responsibility to see that the rules were adhered to.

In 2002 a resolution to admit partners of Tangent or Ladies Circlers who were not Ex-Tablers was rejected and the incoming President stated that this was clear indication that the Association did not want any form of open membership.

Now, in 2005 a resolution to hook back the flood gates has been lost and the President says we must put this behind us and carry on as before.

Every year the National Council reviews the position of all Clubs to see whether they have paid their Capitation fees; those who have not are disaffiliated. Is there a difference between these rule breakers and those who enlist non Ex-Tablers? Will these Clubs, many of whom have now owned up, be Disaffiliated? I think not.

Since the publication of this most recent National Council resolution I have been amazed at the number of members who told me their club would disaffiliate if it was carried. Will the rule breakers, some of who went to the AGM, spoke and/or voted in favour and lost, have the conscience to do the same? – I doubt it.

This resolution opened a wound on an illness which we all knew was festering. It is now to be left untreated until the whole of the Association becomes infected?

In 1996 a line was drawn and any non Ex-Tablers who were Club members at 20th April were allowed to stay as Associates. Now the outgoing Membership & Extension Officer says we must draw another line under the whole issue and the President says we must carry on as before. I ask you, for how long do we wait? Until the Clubs with non Ex-Tablers and another National Council comes up with another variation of the resolution to prop up the membership?

I say we must take action now and find a way to preserve the **Association of Ex-Tablers Clubs** for **Ex-Tablers.** If the rule breakers are allowed to stay they must give up some of their privileges and above all their **voting rights**. It cannot make any sense at all to have Clubs who break the rules, voting to change the rules!

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ON TEST WITH TED WILKINSON of The Guild of Motoring Writers

JAGUAR X-TYPE 2.5 V6 SPORT ESTATE More Space, Still Plenty Of Pace!

Look at the resounding success of BMW's 3 Series Touring, Mercedes-Benz' C Class Estate and the Audi Avant and you don't have to be a motor industry pundit to wonder why Jaguar did not feature an estate car in its line-up.

Wondering ceased early last year when Jaguar launched the X-Type estate that certainly showed the 'establishment' a thing or two about style combined with practical load carrying. Under Ford's ownership all sorts of new things have been happening at Jaguar, including the introduction of diesel powered models, in the X-Type Estate's case, a 2-litre front wheel drive model taking on the mantle as the entry level car, ideal for the high mileage driver in the UK and even more so in some mainland Europe countries.

To a great respect the diesel version is a market sector to itself and the real essence of Jaguar are the more powerful versions employing all-wheel drive and V6 power units. Choose between a 2.5-litre and a 3.0-litre and you are starting to get into the same territory as the Audi Avant Quattro, a market area where there should be some rich pickings providing the product has the credentials.

The 2.5-litre 194 bhp engine in the SE specification test car provided the type of power and refinement to live up to Jaguar's tradition, good for around 135 mph and able to reach 60 mph from rest in around 7.5 seconds. Fuel economy is variable according to use – heavy load and/or a heavy throttle foot and its is down around the 20 mpg mark, a less demanding drive will see another 10 mg achieved with a good dose of driver enjoyment. That's what Jaguar driving is all about. The fully independent suspension system and all-wheel-drive transmission has been well sorted in the saloon and it remains as good in the estate version – plenty of feel through the steering, an excellent ride, great stability, strong braking capability and minimal noise levels. Jaguar refinement as I would expect.

Tested with a five speed manual transmission featuring cruise control it proved a good driving car providing one was sympathetic when changing ratios as the selector gate is not the most accurate I have encountered. You get to live with it or you choose to go the automatic route instead, ideally with the 3-litre engine.

It is a good cabin, especially when it comes to driver comfort where a combination of well padded, generously proportioned supportive seating, good pedal positioning (but no foot rest) plus fully adjustable steering column enable all shapes and sizes of driver to achieve a relaxed but 'with it' driving position. Suede effect leather upholstery and heated front seats also ensure a good lifestyle. Instrumentation is practical though a bit ordinary and this particular model lacked the polished wood touch provided with other 'packages'. To create the estate body Jaguar has not settled for compromise, some observers, rating the estate as a better looker than the saloon. Certainly the side view has the sort of flowing line that is synonymous with a Jaguar and the rear appearance is rakish and highlighted by the high and wide rear window. That high rear window obviously shut off the lose up rear view and makes it a serious case for audio parking sensors or the type of rear view camera now being provided by Nissan on the Primera range.

In practical terms it should rate as a tourer alongside the likes of the BMW 3 Series and Mercedes C Class estates rather than the larger bodied Audis and Volvos.

Consider it a useful machine for a well-heeled couple desiring a good deal of luggage plus space for acquisitions long the route. On that basis it provides a low load platform, a separate opening rear window, 60/40 split folding rear seat but surprising I could not find any luggage securing metal loops nor a ski hatch. There are roof bars but who would want to spoil this car's lines with an ugly non-colour coded roof box. The X-Type estate is what Jaguar needed to compete in the junior executive market and I think that it has sufficient (just) Jaguar character to win a lot of friends. It has not been around for very long, yet I have encountered a fair number of owners who appear to be very satisfied with their car. That's good news for Jaguar!
