Our Communications Strategy is about to change

It is the National Communications Team's hope that the changes we are introducing will lead to a better informed, more involved membership with a greater sense of purpose.

In response to our members' criticism about the National Magazine content, production and circulation costs, we are introducing several significant changes.

THE FIRST CHANGE.....

Welcome to LINKS. The Association's face lifted magazine. Why LINKS? Because it symbolises the number of links associated with The Round Table family. Links between individuals, Clubs, Organisations, both in GB&I and Internationally. Links in the chain through our Tabling lives.

LINKS will in future focus on publishing issues of National interest and will move away from the historical style of publishing the 30 National Council members' reports, which hold limited interest for the majority of club members.

Instead, our liberated pages will reflect the stronger leadership the Association needs to end its decline. The National Council is charged with managing and directing the wellbeing of the Association. The magazine will become a voice by which we hope to encourage all clubs to address key issues. In this copy we focus on the declining membership in both Round Table and 41 Club and offer some practical solutions for clubs to action.

The revised content will attempt to improve members' awareness of the issues facing the Association. Our editorial will both challenge the popular views and encourage debate and will hopefully motivate those members who still care about the wellbeing of their clubs into taking positive action to halt the decline and bring about change.

THE SECOND CHANGE

Welcome to LOCAL LINKS. In June, we introduced a new Newsletter for each Region called LOCAL LINKS. Designed to cover local issues and club news.

Copies have been posted on your Region's page on the Association website and instructions were given to each Club Contact on how to download copies and circulate them to members. We sent out hard copies to 189 clubs who prefer not to use email.

If you have not received a copy let your Councillor know. Better still if you wish to contribute to future issues let your Councillor know. The next issue will be published in September 2006.

ADMINISTRATION & SALES

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THE THIRD CHANGE.....

Several Regions hold regular "Forums". In Ireland Region 2 have an "Exec" Á la Round Table Area. The National Communications Team hope that all Regions will establish their own Forum in the months to come. A spin off maybe the recruitment of Area Representatives to support the National Councillor to bring about a closer alliance of local clubs within Round Table Areas.

THE FOURTH CHANGE....

Not so much a change, but more emphasis on the use of email and the website. Many members are concerned about control of the Association expenses.

Over £50,000 is spent each year on communications to members and clubs. Electronic media will help us significantly reduce our costs.

THE FIFTH CHANGE.....

Presently we enjoy sales income from Small Ads. The Association has paid for a mosaic profile of our membership and will be seeking to offer the opportunity for sponsors to publish details of a number of benefits they can offer our members. Hopefully we will add income to the Association.

We would of course like your views on these changes. We would like even more if local members volunteer articles and material for publishing in their LOCAL LINKS and if deemed of National interest, in LINKS.


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NATIONAL PRESIDENT

WIMBLEDON ROUND TABLE

A lively Gala Dinner ended the middle day. Wimbledon 41 Club traditionally organised and hosted the brunch on the final day.

Newcomers to these weekends are always impressed by the genuine friendship amongst people they have never met before. The gathering was a great success with enjoyment overflowing."

ST FRANCIS HOSPITAL NYENGA UGAND

St Francis hospital is a 100 bed Private-Not-For-Profit hospital, owned and managed by the Lugazi Diocese of the Roman Catholic Church, situated 30km from Kampala, 14kn from Jinja and near the north shore of Lake Victoria. Although there is farming and fishing in the area, the main cash crops being vanilla and coffee, the majority of people are unable to sustain these as they live on such small pieces of land and, therefore, live a hand to mouth existence.

The Leprosy centre was founded in 1932, then elevated to hospital status in 1990 and, although it still treats leprosy and additionally HIV/AIDS patients, the main disease encountered most frequently now is Malaria. This one hospital covers an official catchment area with a population of 133076, but those seeking medical help do not observe such administrative boundaries and 30% of patients come from outside, thereby extrapolating the percentage to cover a population or 173000.

RTBI first became aware of the hospital in 1962 when a Tabler from Moffatt Round Table was working in Uganda. He persuaded his own Table to give financial support to the Leprosy Centre, as it was at that time, then his presentation to the 1968 National Conference gained the interest of Hyde Round Table when they began by sponsoring a child leprosy patient who was totally dependent on the centre.

Destitute children, in particular, seek help from churches and hospitals, these being their only sources of support. Free State education ends at about II-12 years of age, therefore if they are unable to pay, the children are no longer tutored. The Centre advised Hyde RT that the most effective contribution would be to pay for the education of a child patient: £50.00 per annum. The grave political situation took its toll in the country but the local Rotary Club continued to maintain basic services, despite their President being shot dead whilst repairing the water pump.

Through the years Hyde Round Table's contributions continued, until 1989 when membership had decreased to such an extent that it proved impossible to sustain the full range of community service and support hitherto achieved.

In 1998 the club re-established the connection with the centre, now a general hospital, encountering a greatly increased workload. Recent statistics state that 4512 patients were admitted in 2003-04, over half (52%) with malaria. The education of destitute children remained the major problem therefore Hyde 41 Club agreed to sponsor 3 children at £100 per child and individual members, together with Dukinfield and Stalybridge Rotary Club have also made donations, some of which have benefited a new school, built from scratch by the Susuna family, relying on such voluntary donations.

The three children are now approaching adulthood, their formal education coming to an end, and the direction of further financial help will need to be considered. There are no dental, orthopaedic or physiotherapy services in the whole of the district served by the hospital, yet the most pressing need was for an ambulance. The old Landrover was requiring urgent replacement and some months ago Hyde 41 Club was informed that a second-hand ambulance may be available at the cost of £5000, but whilst this lead was actively pursued, the vehicle proved impossible to acquire.

The Annual Report records the hospital's sources of income as the Ugandan Government, some 12 charitable bodies, and fees paid by patients and donations. Despite the low fees many patients find them unaffordable and avoid collection by simply absconding following treatment. The underlying theme of the Report is of a hospital that is providing the services it can afford, and records that such provision must necessarily be incomplete. This compares with the approach in the developed world, where it is taken for granted that a complete range of health services should be provided, and the explanation that any shortfall must lie in the failure of those in charge to recognise the problem or to make the appropriate allocation of funds.

The wider problem of Third World debt continues to be addressed. If and when the debts of Uganda, together with other similar countries, are remitted; and governments' lack of concern for their people prioritised then there may be a marked improvement in the provision of healthcare. It is to be hoped that history does not repeat itself and, in the future, the money will be spent where it should be.


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THE DECLINE OF SERVICE CLUBS

At our Association's Annual Conference I was sitting at the same Dinner table as your new Editor Richard and discussed with him the perennial membership decline problem confronting Round Table and consequently ex-tablers' clubs. I mentioned that I had recently read an excellent book of the findings and thoughts of Robert D Putnam, a Professor of Public Policy at Harvard. It is entitled "Bowling Alone" and was published in 2000 by Simon & Schuster. Drawing on vast new data that reveals Americans' changing behaviour (and for that matter British as well) Putnam shows how we have become increasingly disconnected from one another and how social structures - whether they be PTA, church, fellowship and community service clubs and even political parties- have disintegrated

In the 19th century, chapter-based associations such as the Masons, Odd fellows and Elks clubs flourished. Two important factors were the population growth and the continuing rise in educational levels. By the turn of the century, there became a need for community involvement rather than clubs formed for fellowship amongst like-minded people. This arose because of much more civic awareness. Over the first twenty-five years of the 20th century Rotary and Lions began to get a foothold and Round Table was formed out of Rotary roots in 1927. Apex in Australia and Kinsmen Clubs in Canada had similar beginnings. This was all part of the burst of community involvement.

From his extensive research, Putnam comments at page 55 on the phenomenon as follows:

"By the late 1960s and early 1970s membership growth began to fall further behind population growth. At first, club secretaries long accustomed to announcing new membership records with monotonous annual regularity did not notice that their organizations were failing to keep pace with population growth. As the decline deepened, however, absolute membership began to slip and then to plummet. By the century's close the massive post war boom in membership rates in these organizations had been eliminated".

The post war boom after 1945 appears in virtually all the recognised and established clubs but for most of them the good times had ended by the mid-sixties. Round Table membership peaked in the mid nineteen seventies when I was National President and then slowly declined from some 33,000 to the 9,000 of today, accelerating in the nineteen nineties. Rotary has managed to maintain its membership at some 1.2 million worldwide but this is due mainly to tremendous membership growth in the Far East. In the USA and British Isles, membership is slowly declining at 3 to 4 % per year. Here in RIBI the membership is now 58,000.

In his research, Putnam identifies several areas which he believes have caused this decline in participation in local community groups. He comments that adolescents spend more time alone than with family or friends. Compared with teenagers studied in the 1950s young people in the 1990s reported fewer, weaker, and more fluid friendships. Therefore, they did not want to commit themselves to regular involvement in community-based groups.

Against this bleak picture of social isolation and civic disengagement among recent generations must be set one countervailing fact: without any doubt the last ten years have seen a substantial increase in volunteering and community service by young people in both America and here in the British Isles. This, of course is the recruiting ground for Round Table. Why this welcome and encouraging increase in volunteering has occurred is not yet clear. In part it may simply reflect stronger public encouragement for community service. If this youthful volunteering is driven only by official pressure - (and there is evidence that the current national government has set up various initiatives in this direction) - then one cannot be optimistic that the increase will prove durable.

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On the other hand, a more optimistic interpretation would be that the thirty-year trend towards generational disengagement is at last bottoming out. Round Table has reported an increase in membership of some 10% over the last twelve months. Is this another sign that things are improving?

Therefore, there is strong evidence that the reason why we have seen such a decline in interest in Round Table and Rotary amongst the younger generation is because of their changing attitudes towards their lives and pursuits and, in turn, our clubs. Interestingly, in Rotary, there is a strong tendency for people who have recently retired joining. It is rare for people under forty wanting to be involved and that also applies to Round Table. In our Association we have turned down the concept of men who have not been in Round Table joining. If we want to keep up our declining numbers then we must re-consider the proposal. If there is to be an up-turn in Round Table membership then it will take some time before this becomes of benefit to our Association. We are at a crossroads. If we do not take some action, our membership will continue to decrease to our detriment.

Reference is made by Putnam in his book to "social capital". He took this reference from one L J Hanifan who was a state supervisor of rural schools. Writing in 1916 to urge the importance of community involvement for successful schools, he invoked the idea of "social capital" and described it as:

."...those tangible substances that count for most in the daily lives of people namely goodwill, fellowship, sympathy and social intercourse among the individuals and/or families who make up a social unit...The individual is helpless socially, if left to himself...If he comes into contact with his neighbour, and they with other neighbours, there will be an accumulation of social capital, which may immediately satisfy his social needs and which may bear a social potentiality sufficient to the substantial improvement of living conditions in the whole community..."

At the conclusion of his book Putnam poses several questions which he asks to be answered in a decade. They are worthy of repetition because they are the same conundrums that we should be asking. A summary is as follows:

Let us find ways to ensure that our citizens will spend less leisure time sitting passively in front of glowing screens and more time in active connection with their fellow citizens. Let us foster new forms of entertainment and electronic communication that reinforce community engagement rather than forestalling it.

Let us find ways to ensure that the level of community engagement amongst our young people in all parts of our society will match that of their grandparents when they were that same age, and that at the same time bridging social capital will be substantially greater than it was in their grandparents' era.

Let us find ways to ensure that by 2015 Britain's workplace will be substantially more family-friendly and community-congenial, so that our workers will be enabled to replenish our stocks of social capital both within and outside the workplace.

Let us spur a new, pluralistic, socially responsible "great awakening", so that by 2015 we will be more deeply engaged than we are today in one or another spiritual community of meaning, while at the same time becoming more tolerant to one another.

....It may be that we should be more involved in helping Round Table....

I know that these are high moralistic challenges but we must all take steps to ensure that the world of doing good coupled with enjoyment which we have all experienced survives and expands once again.

Perhaps Round Table will have to look at its way of running each unit to see how it can be more attractive to young people. It may be that we should be more involved in helping Round Table.

There is no panacea. We live in difficult times for promoting social capital awareness, involvement and activity but I know that we have to participate more to survive. Putnam's Bowling Alone has identified a central crisis at the heart of our society and suggests what we can do.

What do you think we can we do or is it inevitable that we shall cease to exist?

Too often the answer seems to be that it doesn't matter at all - to anybody! Our communities haven't a clue who we are or where we came from or what we stand for. What is even more worrying is that our own, personal membership of this great Association of ours that has just celebrated a great milestone in its history, doesn't seem to matter to us anymore. We don't wear our badge with pride as we were once extolled to do as members of Round Table. As we go out and about our daily business we haven't a clue who might be a member because for some reason we no longer wish to proclaim the fact that we belong to the Association by wearing our lapel badge or by displaying a roundel in our cars. Is this symptomatic of the 'disease' which seems to be affecting our society today - the 'disease' that is outlined by Rodney Huggins in his article 'The Decline of Service Clubs' which appears elsewhere in this magazine? Have we been infected by the malaise which seems to have infected every level of our society - or have we simply grown old and tired and lost the sense of vision and purpose which inspired and motivated us when we were in Round Table?

When I joined Table in the mid 1970's I felt privileged to be invited to be a member. Throughout my time in Table I felt motivated by the ideas and energy which my fellow members brought to meetings. I learned to stand on my feet and argue my corner and in turn to motivate others and these skills or qualities carried over into my professional life. When Round Table put its mind to it, I firmly believed that we could change the world. As a movement we certainly changed lives and helped countless numbers of people through our organisational skills and fund-raising activities and I was proud to be a part of it.

And I was proud to become a member of 41 club when, along with a group of friends who left Table at more or less the same time, we set up a new club because we'd found it difficult to 'break in' to a large and well established club that already existed.

But then what happened? I certainly cherished and continue to cherish the friendships that were formed way back in Table days but what do we do? Why do we meet? How long can we hold together when we more or less repeat the same programme of activities year after year? There comes a point when we will say – enough is enough – I can't be bothered anymore – let's pack it in.

I know that to be true because in my first few weeks as National Membership Officer I have received letters from all over the country painting just that picture – and we have got to do something about it otherwise our organisation - like so many others - will just trickle away into the sand and be no more!



But there is a ray of hope! I have also received 4 applications from keen ex Tablers who feel that there should still be active fellowship as part of the Round Table family in the areas where they live and they are asking advice on how to start or resurrect a 41 club.

Apart from pointing them in the direction of our web-site where they can find all the advice they need, along with the Affiliation application form, I'm also pointing them to the 'purposes of 41 club' – the Aims and Objects of our Association if you like – which can be found in our Club Handbook and Directory.

Never seen them? Take a look. They could change the focus of your club and give it a whole new sense of purpose and direction – which is exactly what we need if we are to go forward and attract new members and – dare I say it – contribute something to our society.

I would agree with much of what Rodney Huggins says in his article. I think we all would: we've felt that something was going wrong in our society for too long but we may not have been able to articulate it quite so well. I firmly believe that it is only through organisations such as Round Table and 41 Club, Rotary and Lions that we will be able to address the 'I'm alright Jack — what's in it for me?' malaise which is endemic in our country today. But to do so we need to regain a sense of purpose and that's a debate that is beginning to happen at National level and it should also be happening at individual club and regional level.

We bring a huge amount of knowledge, professional skill and expertise to our Association and it seems a pity that it's not harnessed in some way – especially when it's informed by what we know we can achieve when we put our minds to it – as we did in our Round Table days. To adopt and adapt a phrase that stirred up our nation in the early 1900's – our country needs us – even though we may feel ourselves over the hill and rapidly going down the other side. Membership can matter if ... we regain a sense of purpose in our Association!

YOU HAVE HEARD THE WORDS. NOW LET'S SEE SOME ACTION....

As a member of two 41 Clubs (one with nearly 100 members and the other having grown from 36 members to 50 in three years) the idea that falling membership is a problem is perhaps not seen as an issue. However it would be a mistake to be complacent. Both clubs are very vibrant and enjoy in different ways a full programme of events and fellowship. Importantly volunteers come forward each year to fill the roles. But as one new member reminded us we are all getting older and while we may feel healthy at present, in a few years things may be less vibrant.

Fortunately we have active Round Tables connected to the clubs but it is by no means certain that Tablers will want to join us. We make sure that contact is maintained with these Tables and 6 ex -Tablers have joined the smaller club this year. So what are our options for the next couple of years.

We have had open membership ruled out for the present at least. The majority of new members in both clubs now come from the ranks of ex Tablers who have moved into the area. It is interesting to consider how many eligible Ex Tablers there are in GB&l. Is it possible that between twenty and thirty thousand potential members exist? The top figure is larger than our current membership which suggests if we found them all we could double the membership of clubs. Further this market is bigger than anything Round Table will produce in the short term.

For many years National Presidents and National Membership Officers have exhorted clubs to take action on membership. From my experience of several 41 clubs the subject is never on the agenda. It is never discussed. No one to my knowledge has ever been charged with the responsibility of marketing their club and it is simply left to word of mouth or the odd keen member that brings people to meetings, The personality of the club also has a huge bearing on whether new members will feel welcome. As a National Councillor I have not always been met with a smile of welcome!

So how can we get a sense of purpose and motivation to attract new blood, new ideas and volunteers to stop us having to do the chair for the umpteenth time. First of all "Membership" has to be on the meeting agenda. This is where leadership is required from our Club Chairmen. For an organisation which proudly boasted Adopt Adapt Improve 41 club members have to accept that in their stewardship the movement of which we are so proud looks to be in terminal decline. But it is not too late

It is not rocket science and like most things in Clubs, just one enthusiast can move mountains.

Some suggestions....

Discuss at a club meeting and agree to set up a working party to be led by a keen volunteer charged with sourcing membership for your club.

Approve a small budget (£200?) to cover advertisements in local papers to make people aware of 41 Club's existence.

Talk to local press, radio, tourist departments and find out who keeps the local directory of clubs and associations in your town.

Hold interviews with reporters and get on radio, publish details of your club.

Talk to other service clubs Rotary, Probus, Lions etc.

Post advertisements in doctor's surgeries, libraries, tourist offices, estate agents and on supermarket notice boards for example.

If a member moves contact the local club to let them know he is coming.

Contact lapsed members and get commitment to attend meetings.

Hold a membership night.

Open a club website.

Talk to all Tablers over 40 if you have a Table.

Contact all ex Tablers who have not joined your club and if they don't want to join suggest they start their own club and you will help.

Discuss with your Table to discourage repeated honorary years being offered to retired Tablers particularly if they are deferring joining 41 Club.

There is strength in numbers, so talk to other clubs and recruit them to a local team to benefit all clubs.

Attend Round Table Area meetings and tell them what you are doing.

If a club nearby is closing get them to join your club.

Take the initiative and start a local club's forum and use the affinity that developed in Table to increase momentum.

New members bring more than just numbers, they can bring new enthusiasm and new ideas provided they are made welcome.

The first step will be the hardest but the rewards will be amazing.

Make it Happen!

Throughout the year there is a full calendar of events taking place around the world. These include the AGM and Half Yearly Meeting of 41 International, the AGMs of the various Associations, Number Club meetings, ski and sailing weekends and Regional get togethers plus Charter Presentations and Anniversary Dinners. In addition to all this activity many individual clubs and indeed individual members have regular visits to and from other clubs where contacts and friendships have been forged over many years.

Many of the meetings take place in interesting and exotic locations. Recently I attended the AGM of 41 Club Denmark which was held in "Hamlets" castle in Elsinore. Two weeks ago National President Ian and I were in Dortmund for the 41 International AGM. The AGM proper was held in the afternoon. It was all fairly non-contentious but the good news was that GB&I was approved to host the International Vice-Presidency in 2008/9 and our own John Bellwood will therefore be International President in 2009/10.

Uwe Kersten from Germany took over from South Africa's John Hudson as International President.

Looking ahead there are HYMs, with pre-tours, to Zambia and Mauritius and a tour to Australia with Apex 40 is being considered. There is a Euro 3 meeting on the 8th/9th/10th September 2006 in Saumur, France, the Iberian Cluster, 6/8th October in Puerto Banus Spain and the HYM of 41 International at Sunny Southend-on-Sea the following weekend 13/15th October. We have just chartered a new club in Calpe, Spain and I am hopeful that there may be other clubs soon in Tenerife and Poland.

We are the largest Association in 41 International and many of the others tend to take the lead from us. Their events are often modelled on our functions but are always that bit different and include the flavour of the country. There are a number of stalwarts who attend many of the meetings but it would be great to see more from the UK. Do not worry about being unable to speak a foreign language. The official language of 41 International is English and in any case most of the persons you are likely to meet usually speak fairly good English. If you can say a few words in the local language it will be very well received.

If you have a contact / twin-club please let me know. It is always useful to know who is going where. In the same vein, if you already travel or receive visits why not go further and attend other functions abroad? Many members ask me for information about 41 overseas. They may be going abroad on holiday, for business or even emigrating. I am always pleased to try and assist but I failed with requests for China, Vietnam and Beirut!! An International calendar is published on our web-site and in the Directory. I can usually supply information concerning most of the events listed with maybe a few others as well. If you would like me to visit your club I would be very pleased to do so, it will cost you nothing to invite me along unless you wish to buy me a drink!

I know members ask "what do we get from 41 International" and "why do we belong"? The answer is a great deal but you must participate to enjoy the benefits. Please do not "knock" it until you have tried it. Get involved, you will not regret it.

THE PRESIDENT'S CHARITY

epilepsy action

Epilepsy is one of those health conditions that happens to 'other people'. Few of us believe that it will impact on us or our family. For many of us, that means that we can safely leave it off the list of things that concern us. Epilepsy is further distanced from our lives by the stigma that, even today, can prevent people being open about having the condition.

Hearing the words "you have epilepsy" is never easy. People certainly never forget that visit to the doctor! At the very least it means people face years, if not a lifetime, on medication. It means automatically losing your driving licence for at least a year. If medication fails to control the seizures, life can be interrupted at any time - at work, in your sleep, while you are out shopping or in the pub. For children, it can sometimes result in being bullied but often means missed lessons and struggling to keep up with classmates. Family and friends have to learn what to do when faced with a seizure. Employers and teachers have to be prepared to adjust tasks.

From the immediate anxiety and shock of diagnosis, people often move on to a lengthy struggle to find the best treatment. The medication can have numerous side effects. A chronic lack of specialists means many people never see a doctor that is trained in epilepsy treatment. Around 1,000 people die in the UK every year as a direct result of their epilepsy; around 500 of these deaths could potentially be prevented with better understanding and greater investment medical care.

For some people with epilepsy it is normal life that happens to 'other people'. Frequent seizures can mean anything up to hundreds a week. People can be severely disabled by the condition. Anxious to avoid seizures in public, people can become isolated and lonely. Fear of passing the condition on - something that is in fact very rare - has stopped people marrying and having families.

Epilepsy Action is run by and for people living with epilepsy - people with the condition, their friends and families and their health professionals. Last year, over 550,000 people used our services - no mean feat for a charity with just 61 staff! They used our free Helpline, used our free information material, received care from our Sapphire Nurses, were visited by our Accredited volunteers or met new friends through our national branch network.

The 41 Club President, Ian MacKenzie has chosen Epilepsy Action as the charity for the term of his presidency and we look forward to a successful partnership. With your help we can support those 550,000 people and more; we can continue to push epilepsy up the agenda for politicians and healthcare providers, and we can continue to lobby for the changes necessary to save those 500 people that die every year.
